Methodology


February Omnibus 2021

This study was conducted from January 28th to 30th, 2021, among a sample of 1,427 respondents who are eligible voters in Ontario who are members Maru/Blue's online panel Maru Voice Canada. For comparison purposes. a probability sample of this size has cm estimated margin of error of +/- 2.6%. 19 times out of 20. Discrepancies in or between totals are due to rounding.

Where and how is the study conducted?

The study included respondents from an online panel of Ontarians, 18 years of age or older. The sample is weighted to regional, age and gender demographics, as per Statistics Canada.






representation of the Contracting COVID-19 - Age and Gender

Significantly higher than Ontario Significantly lower than Ontario

79% of voters remain "concerned" about contracting COVID. Females are somewhat more concerned than males.






Q1. How concerned are you about contracting COVID-19? n = 1427



Significantly higher than Ontario Significantly lower than Ontario

57% of voters believe government has done a "good job" while 39% believe government has done a "bad job". Older voters tend to give the government higher marks.







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




Q3. Now that vaccines for COVID-19 have been approved by Health Canada, do you want to receive the vaccine when it is available to you? n = 1427

Willingness to receive the Health Canada approved vaccine? - Regions






Q3. Now that vaccines for COVID-19 have been approved by Health Canada, do you want to receive the vaccine when it is available to you? n = 1427

Nearly half of voters believe that the vaccine should be mandatory with older males even more in support of the vaccine being mandatory.




Q4. Should the vaccine for COVID-19 be mandatory for all people living in Canada? n = 1427



Most voters believe that the federal government is responsible for acquiring vaccines. Millennials and females under 35 years of age, are not as certain as on this as older voters are.




Q5. Which level of Government do you believe should be responsible for the acquisition of the vaccines? n = 1427

Voters across all regions breakout roughly the same way on this question, with some more voters in Halton and Peel Regions believing that the provincial government is responsible for acquiring vaccines.




Q5. Which level of Government do you believe should be responsible for the acquisition of the vaccines? n = 1427

Most voters believe that the provincial government is responsible for distribution of vaccines. Females under 35 years of age, are not as certain as on this as other voters are.




Q6. Which level of Government do you believe should be responsible for the distribution of the vaccines? n = 1427

Level of government responsible for distribution of vaccines - Regions



Most voters across all the regions believe that the provincial government is responsible for distribution of vaccines. There are some more voters in Eastern Region that think this is a federal responsibility.




Q6. Which level of Government do you believe should be responsible for the distribution of the vaccines? n = 1427

Just over 50% blame the federal government and 15% blame the provincial government. Females are somewhat more "undecided" (or they won't say) at this time.



Who do you blame the most for the lack of vaccines available? - Regions





78% of voters agree with the "State of Emergency" & "Stay-at-home" Orders that were issued on Jan 14th and resulting new restrictions implemented. Older females are more in support than males.



Q8. Ontario announced a new "State of Emergency" for 28 days beginning on Jan 14th, and a "stay at home" order lasts until Feb 10th. New restrictions are as follows: Everyone able to stay home & work from home must stay home. All non-essential businesses, such as hardware stores, retail stores, alcohol retailers & like businesses must close by 8pm with exemptions for businesses that sell food, pharmacies, gas stations, convenience stores & restaurants that have food delivery service. Schools in Peel Region, City of Toronto, City of Windsor-Essex, York Region & Hamilton Region will not return to in-class learning until at least February 10th. They will only be doing online learning. Greater authority is being given to law enforcement and by-law enforcement officers to enforce the new restrictions, including issuing tickets and fines. Indoor public events and social gatherings are forbidden, and outdoor gatherings must be limited to only 5 people. Religious ceremonies remain limited to 10 people indoors or 10 people outdoors. All indoor sports and fitness venues are closed. Personal care services must close. Non-essential construction work must be stopped.




Do you agree or disagree with the new measures and restrictions that were implemented? n = 1427




Do you agree or disagree with the new measures and restrictions that were implemented? n = 1427

Voters are quite split on whether or not the government should proceed with a "region by region" or a "province-wide" approach when introducing or retracting new restrictions.









76% of voters agree with the closing of in-class learning for most schools until Feb 10th. Females tend to agree even more than males.




Do you agree or disagree with this new restriction brought in by the government of Ontario? n = 1427




Do you agree or disagree with this new restriction brought in by the government of Ontario? n = 1427

Agree/Disagree that elementary students can safely return on Feb 10th - Age & Gender





n Agree/Disagree that elementary students can safely return on Feb 10th - Regions





Agree/Disagree that high school students can safely return on Feb 10th - Age and Gender




43% of voters agree that high school school students can return safely on Feb 10th, while 41% disagree. Males over 35 years of age agree more than females 18-34 years of age.




Q12. Do you agree or disagree that high school students (Grade 9 to Grade 12) can return to school on Wednesday, February 10th - full-time and safely? n = 1427

Voters in the City of Ottawa, Eastern, Northern and Southwestern Regions are more in agreement, while voters in the GTHA much more evenly split.




Q12. Do you agree or disagree that high school students (Grade 9 to Grade 12) can return to school on Wednesday, February 10th - full-time and safely? n = 1427






Provincial Ballot Test - Age and Gender



17% of voters remain "undecided" on who they will vote for. PCs are leading with both males and females 35 years of age or older. PCs and ONDP tied with millennial males. ONDP holds a large lead over the PCs and the OLP with 18-34 year old females.




P1 / P2 - Thinking about provincial politics, which Party would you most likely vote for if a provincial election were held tomorrow? n = 1427




P1 / P2 - Thinking about provincial politics, which Party would you most likely vote for if a provincial election were held tomorrow? n = 1427

Significantly higher than Ontario Significantly lower than Ontario

When looking at just "decided" voters, the PCs lead is very large among males over 35 years of age and significantly strong with females over 35 years of age. The ONDP has climbed into 2nd place and the OLP is in big trouble at the moment.




Decided - P1 / P2 - Thinking about provincial politics, which Party would you most likely vote for if a provincial election were held tomorrow? n = 1167

Pocided Provincial Ballot Test - Regions

Significantly higher than Ontario Significantly lower than Ontario

If the PCs are able to maintain this lead and the OLP and ONDP continue to split the vote as they currently are, they will pick up seats in Norther Ontario, Hamilton, Niagara and in the City of Toronto. Note: 2011 Federal Election where in Ontario, the CPC received 44%, the LPC received 26% and the NDP received 25%. This could mean a 13 seat pick-up for the Ford PCs.
