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SCHEDULE "A"

- The Defendants, Ezra Levant (hereinafter "Levant"), Rebel Media Holdings Inc., and Rebel News Network Ltd. (collectively, "Rebel"), deny all allegations contained in the Plaintiff's Claim unless otherwise admitted to herein.
- 2. The Defendants specifically deny that the Plaintiff is entitled to the relief claimed in paragraph 1 of the Plaintiff's Claim, and put the Plaintiff to the strict proof thereof.
- 3. The Defendants admit the allegations contained in paragraphs 3, 4, and 15 of the Plaintiff's Claim.

The Facts

- 4. Rebel did broadcast an episode of *The Ezra Levant Show* from Lethbridge, Alberta on July 25, 2023 (the "July 25 Podcast"), during which Levant provides on-site reportage outside the Lethbridge courthouse. The July 25 Podcast is accessible online under the title "I'm in Lethbridge as justice hangs in the balance for the Coutts 4 truckers". A copy of the July 25 Podcast can be viewed at the following private link, created for the purpose of this litigation: www.July25Podcast.com.
- 5. The main subject of the July 25 Podcast is the arrest and trial of four participants in the Freedom Convoy protests (the "Coutts 4"), who had been arrested on allegations that they conspired to kill Royal Canadian Mounted Police ("RCMP") officers.
- 6. The Coutts 4 has been connected by law enforcement agencies and journalists to the Diagolon movement. According to numerous media sources, including CTV News, *The Star-Phoenix*, Global News, CBC News, and *The National Post*, Diagolon is an extremist militia network led by the Plaintiff. A copy of the CTV News article, "What is the Diagolon extremist group and what does it want?", published February 17, 2022, is attached hereto as **Exhibit "A"**.
- 7. According to a CBC news report, Diagolon's goal is to accelerate a civil war in order to create a "white ethnonationalist state" which would "run diagonally from the Pacific Northwest through Canada to Florida". A copy of the CBC News article, "RCMP investigating rape threat against Pierre Poilievre's wife", last updated September 27,

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2022, is attached hereto as **Exhibit "B"**. The article's headline refers to statements made by the Plaintiff during an online stream, during which he threatened to rape Anaida Poilievre, wife of Conservative Leader Pierre Poilievre.

- 8. The Plaintiff is a "shock jock" who deliberately courts outrage and controversy. He calls his livestream a "ragecast" and goes by the handle "Raging Dissident" for his social media accounts. The Plaintiff regularly makes racist, misogynist, antisemitic, and abusive comments during his podcasts, including comments made against defendant Levant, who is Jewish.
- 9. The July 25 Podcast is 43 minutes and 43 seconds long, and incorporates excerpts from news reportage by another news outlet in order to provide background information on Diagolon, as well as an excerpt from a livestream broadcast by the Plaintiff himself. The Plaintiff first appears approximately at the 11:12 minute mark of the July 25 Podcast. The Plaintiff is not mentioned prior to that point.
- 10. Levant himself does not refer to Diagolon until approximately 30 minutes into the July 25 Podcast. Levant first asks his viewers what connected the Coutts 4 to each other. Levant then refers to Diagolon as "a made-up joke group in Canada", "an absurd meme", a "joke", and "a prank", but adds that "I think people started to believe in it." According to Levant's theory, the Coutts 4 started to believe in Diagolon as more than a mere prank.
- 11. Levant does not refer to the Plaintiff by name until approximately the 33:15 minute mark of the July 25 Podcast. Levant states as follows:

Now, Jeremy MacKenzie had a, had a, reputable past, in that he served our country in the Canadian Armed Forces, and that should be mentioned every time his name is referred to. But he has set up an explicitly racist organization. I think it's as a joke, but he's gone beyond a joke to really providing the missing glue for those on the left who would accuse conservatives and populists of being terrorists...

And it's my belief, and we'll see if it's borne out in trial next year, that the four men here, they were – there's a phrase on the Internet, LARPing (L-A-R-P), live action role playing - that they were sort of pretending to be in the Diagolon, ...

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and they got the patches and it wasn't really a thing but it was a pretend thing almost like Dungeons and Dragons, except for one day in Lethbridge and in Coutts Alberta their make-believe came true, and they weren't just talking tough about Diagolon, there actually were cops everywhere.

Suddenly, they're transformed from being 'oh, that's just a country boy and his rifle and bullets' to 'oh, there's a Diagolon patch there, this is part of some uprising revolutionary war'. I guess what I'm saying is Diagolon, which is a fake joke, because of course when it comes to hatred, demand exceeds supply.

12. Levant goes on to speculate during the July 25 Podcast that Diagolon was what the mainstream media needed to convince people "that there was a right wing hate group out there that we had to be scared of." Levant further states the following, starting around the 35:57 minute mark of the July 25 Podcast:

And it's my theory, and again I'm not basing this on any secret documents, but it's my theory, based on what I've learned about the men [i.e. the Coutts 4], and what I've seen in the media, and frankly with my conversations with one of the family members, that these young men actually went too far into Jeremy MacKenzie's scheme weird fake group. And so the police and the prosecutor said, "Uh huh, that's the conspiracy. That's the connection. That's the group. They're not Hell's Angels. They're not Al-Qaeda. But they are – Diagolon. And for all of those who thought it was just a joke, now it's very real, and look, we have guns and bullets, and normally those would just be country boys, but no no, that's Diagolon.

And I was shocked to learn yesterday while I was literally sitting in this court, it came up on my phone, a news headline, that that same Jeremy MacKenzie, the head of Diagolon, the most hated right wing alt-right group in Canada that is a talking point for every left wing journalist and politician, he just had a bunch of firearms charges against him dropped. I mean, he was on video with illegal restricted firearms pointing them at people. He was doing – he was transporting guns illegally. He wasn't just a guy who had guns. For example some of the guys in here I know for a fact had a, a PAL license. They had guns, sure, but they were completely legal. I don't know if there were some illegalities, but I know they had a license. This Jeremy MacKenzie was transporting guns illegally, having illegal guns, pointing guns at people. Like he was doing a

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whole whack of things. Isn't it odd that the leader of the Diagolon isn't in jail for 500 days, but these pawns on the chess board are in jail for 500 days. I tell you, it sure looks like a fed to me.

Looks a little bit like in the United States, Ray Epps, do you know who I mean? He was the guy who was exhorting everyone to storm Capitol Hill on January 6. He's a reminder of Ray Epps.

13. After showing excerpts from videos taken during the Capitol riot on January 6, 2021, which show suspected provocateur Ray Epps interacting with the crowd and being called a "Fed" by several people in that crowd, Levant goes on to state the following, starting around the 39:19 minute mark of the July 25 Podcast:

Is it absurd to say that Jeremy MacKenzie is the Ray Epps of Canada? Certainly not absurd. A generation ago, you might recall that CSIS actually created a hate group called the Heritage Front. And a CSIS agent named Grant Bristow led it. The man who actually led Canada's most notorious hate group was working for the government the whole time. He was creating hate. Even back then, supply did not meet demand for hate, and so many people profited off that.

•••

And I think that the four guys here, this is my theory, I think they believed it. I think for them this Dungeons and Dragons role playing became real. And I think that Jeremy MacKenzie is the reason that these charges were laid and that these men are in prison. And he may be the reason that they are convicted. He gave the prosecution what they were missing. He gave them the connection. He invented the fake Hell's Angels, the fake Al-Qaeda. And what an irony, what a coincidence, that the day these men have their hearing is the day the prosecution just decides to drop those charges against the boss of the Diagolon. It's a bit curious, isn't it?

14. Levant concludes the July 25 Podcast with the following remarks, which began around the 42:53 minute mark:

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It's interesting in there, a lot of people love Rebel News. They've seen us as this courthouse probably, I don't know, 10 times. But there are some people who love the Diagolon, who love Jeremy MacKenzie, and who believe that, well, who believe that terrible wrongs are going on. We'll see who's right in a year's time, when it all comes out at trial. That's it for today. Until tomorrow, on behalf of all of us at Rebel News, to you at home, good night, and keep fighting for freedom.

No Defamation

- 15. The Defendants deny that they have defamed the Plaintiff as alleged in the Plaintiff's Claim, or at all.
- 16. The Defendants state that insofar as the words complained of in the July 25 Podcast consist of statements of fact, the said words convey only their natural and ordinary meaning, and are true in substance and in fact.
- 17. With respect to the defence of justification, it has been widely reported in the media by sources including Global News, *The Star-Phoenix*, CTV News, CBC News, *The Globe and Mail, The National Post*, and CityNews Halifax that Diagolon is a racist organization, and that its members are antisemites and Holocaust deniers who spread neo-Nazi and white supremacist propaganda. It has also been widely reported that the Plaintiff founded Diagolon. As an example, a copy of the *Toronto Star* article, "Rightwing activist says he meant no harm with 'joke' about raping Pierre Poilievre's wife" published September 26, 2022, is attached hereto as **Exhibit "C"**.
- 18. Although Levant does state that the Plaintiff "set up an explicitly racist organization", he immediately qualifies that statement by adding, "I think it's as a joke".
- 19. With respect to the allegation that Levant states or implies in the July 25 Podcast that the Plaintiff concocted a social movement to entrap the Coutts 4 in a criminal offence, no such statement was made or implied during the July 25 Podcast. On the contrary, Levant clearly states during the July 25 Podcast that the Plaintiff started Diagolon as a joke or a prank, and that the Coutts 4 got into trouble because they took the joke seriously and went too far with their role playing.

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- 20. The Defendants further state that insofar as the words complained of in the July 25 Podcast consist of expressions of opinion, they are fair and *bona fide* comments on a matter of public interest, based on fact, and expressed honestly and without malice on the part of the Defendants.
- 21. With respect to the defence of fair comment, Levant based his statements on information that had been previously reported and was widely available to the public. Moreover, Levant prefaces many of his statements by saying "I think", "it's my belief", and "it's my theory", making his statements clearly recognizable as comment.
- 22. Levant indicates during the July 25 Podcast that viewers will see if his belief is "borne out in trial next year", and ends the podcast by stating that "We'll see who's right in a year's time, when it all comes out at trial."
- 23. With respect to the allegation that it is stated or implied in the July 25 Podcast that the Plaintiff is a government agent, Levant states his opinion during the July 25 Podcast that the Plaintiff might appear to be "a fed" based on the different treatment he received as someone charged with weapons-related crimes when compared to the treatment received by the Coutts 4. Levant makes it clear that he is stating his opinion only when he indicates that this is what it "looks like...to me". Levant is providing his opinion based on the known facts.
- 24. With respect to the known facts, the Plaintiff has publicly admitted to acting as an informant for law enforcement, including on the following occasions:
 - a. While giving evidence before the Public Order Emergency Commission that investigated the use of the *Emergencies Act* to end the Freedom Convoy's blockade protests, the Plaintiff testified that he had previously reported extremist behaviour to the RCMP, and that he was willing to have a continuing relationship with law enforcement to assist them with identifying legitimate threats to public safety. A copy of the transcript of Jeremy MacKenzie's testimony before the Public Order Emergency Commission on November 4, 2022 is attached hereto as **Exhibit "D**".

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- b. The Plaintiff further admitted to calling the RCMP about "a bunch of knuckleheads in the woods" and asked the RCMP "are you going to do anything about that or are you going to keep fucking me around?" A video recording of the Plaintiff making these statements was posted on X (formerly Twitter) on or about August 14, 2023, and can be accessed at the following link: https://twitter.com/rkpall/status/1691081352962011136.
- c. On November 5, 2023, the Plaintiff published several posts on X (formerly Twitter) in which he encouraged "affected parties" to contact the Calgary Police or their local police force about a fraud allegedly perpetrated by a woman connected to the Freedom Convoy and "#Coutts4 activity". The Plaintiff in his posts informs the woman that he has reported her for welfare fraud. He also calls the woman a "pig" and a thief and asks, "Does your daughter know how much of a piece of shit criminal you are? Maybe she should and her father." A copy of Jeremy MacKenzie's posts on X (formerly Twitter) of November 5, 2023 are attached hereto as **Exhibit "E"**.
- d. On November 6, 2023, the Plaintiff posted on X that he had just "spent all day giving debriefs to police about your activity" in reference to the same woman he accused of welfare fraud the day before. He refers to her as "Pig". A copy of Jeremy MacKenzie's post on X (formerly Twitter) of November 6, 2023 is attached hereto as Exhibit "F".
- 25. In addition, *The Globe and Mail* published an article about the Plaintiff with the headline, "Creator of far-right, anti-government group testifies that he received police information during convoy protests" on November 4, 2022. A copy of this *Globe and Mail* article is attached hereto as **Exhibit "G"**.
- 26. The Defendants further state that the words complained of in the July 25 Podcast were published on an occasion of qualified privilege. The Defendants had a personal interest and/or duty in publishing the statements, and the persons receiving the statements had a corresponding duty and/or interest in receiving them. The statements were made honestly and without any indirect or improper motive.

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- 27. The Defendants further state that the statements made in the July 25 Podcast were a responsible communication on a matter of public interest. When making the statements, the Defendants acted according to the standards of responsible journalism.
- 28. The Defendants state that the statements in the July 25 Podcast were not published maliciously, and were not intended to harm the reputation of the Plaintiff and in fact did not harm his reputation.

No Damages

- 29. The Defendants deny that the Plaintiff has sustained the damages alleged in the Plaintiff's Claim, or any damages at all.
- 30. In the alternative, if the Plaintiff has sustained any damages, such damages are grossly exaggerated, remote, speculative, unforeseeable, and unrecognized at law, and were not caused or contributed to by any act or omission on the part of the Defendants, and the Plaintiff has failed to mitigate his damages.
- 31. The Plaintiff has specifically failed to provide any evidence of harm to his reputation, or that his reputation is capable of being harmed by the impugned statements. In this regard, the Defendants rely on the following:
 - Levant prefaced his comments with respect to the Plaintiff by emphasizing that the Plaintiff had a reputable past and served his country in the Canadian Armed Forces.
 - b. The Plaintiff has been identified as a national security risk by Public Safety Minister Marco Mendicino. A copy of the CTV News article, "Freedom Convoy' leader challenged over assertion the protest was never told to leave", last updated November 6, 2022, is attached hereto as **Exhibit "H"**.
 - c. The Plaintiff was charged in August 2022 with assault, pointing a firearm at someone, mischief, and use of a restricted weapon following an incident in Saskatchewan. He was also charged with criminal harassment, uttering threats, and at least 10 counts of possessing restricted firearms and prohibited magazines. See Exhibit "B" and Exhibit "G".

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- d. The Plaintiff regularly espouses antisemitic conspiracies, parrots Holocaust denial lines, and disparages Jews and Muslims, in addition to promoting hate literature. A copy of the Anti-Racist Canada blogspot "Jeremy Mackenzie: Nova Scotia-Based Extremist YouTuber Spreads Hate" dated February 14, 2020 is attached hereto as Exhibit "I". The blogspot, including videos and audio recordings, can be accessed at https://anti-racistcanada.blogspot.com/2020/02/jeremy-mackenzie-nova-scotia-based.html.
- e. The Plaintiff has stated his view that the Nuremberg Trials were "a kangaroo court". A copy of *The Georgia Straight* article, "Raging Dissident Jeremy MacKenzie's pal Chris Lysak charged with conspiracy to commit murder", published February 16, 2022, is attached hereto as **Exhibit "J"**.
- f. The Plaintiff suggested raping the wife of Conservative Party leader Pierre Poilievre during an online stream. The Plaintiff stated during that stream:

Let's rape her. It's not really a sex thing. It's like we just want to show people that we can do things to you if we want to. It's a power move.

The Plaintiff also made several racist and derogatory comments about Anaida Poilievre's Venezuelan background. See **Exhibit "B"**.

- g. In response to the Plaintiff's threats of sexual violence, the Conservative Party leader publicly denounced the Plaintiff and his associates as "dirtbags", "losers", and "odious". The Plaintiff was also denounced by Prime Minister Trudeau and NDP leader Jagmeet Singh, as well as other public figures. See Exhibit "B".
- h. A former friend of the Plaintiff applied for a peace bond because the harassment she had suffered at the hands of the Plaintiff and his girlfriend was making her suicidal. The harassment did not stop even after the former friend's 11-year-old son died. A copy of the article "Happy International Women's Day from Jeremy MacKenzie!" as published on March 9, 2023 by Frank Magazine is attached hereto as **Exhibit "K"**.

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- i. In Telegram messages posted on August 3 and November 12, 2023, the Plaintiff stated that Zionism is "based upon Jewish supremacy and dominion over all other races" and that he rejected this "cult on the learned elders of Diaglon's [sic] decree that it is both very fake and very gay." A copy of the Plaintiff's Telegram messages as published on August 3, 2023 and November 12, 2023 are attached hereto as Exhibit "L".
- j. In a Telegram message posted on November 12, 2023, the Plaintiff asked, "Are there any food service industry jobs owned and operated by white people in Nova Scotia anymore, or is it exclusively for indian migrants?" He ended his post by stating, "Trying to avoid food poisoning multiple times a month is the new white supremacy!" A copy of the Plaintiff's Telegram message as published on November 12, 2023 is attached hereto as **Exhibit "M**".
- k. During the July 25 Podcast, Levant even-handedly ended his comments with respect to the Plaintiff by telling his viewers that some people love the Plaintiff, and agree with his views.
- I. The Plaintiff responded to the July 25 Podcast by referring to the Defendants as "Jew supremacist media", feigning shock, and yawning by emoji. In a message posted on Telegram on July 25, 2023, the Plaintiff (posting as "Raging Dissident") stated that Levant "has to talk about me to try and drum up clicks for his financially struggling media business as well as support the fake conservative establishment." The Plaintiff then brazenly defamed Levant by adding, "I'd almost feel bad for Ezra Levant if he didn't lie and swindle senior citizens for a living." A copy of the Plaintiff's Telegram message as published on July 25, 2023 is attached hereto as Exhibit "N".
- m. In a Telegram message posted on August 3, 2023, the Plaintiff called Levant a "Jewish supremacist", and explained "That's literally what Zionism is." He also referred to "their insane beliefs of racial supremacy spouted by your own Rabbis". A copy of the Plaintiff's Telegram message as published on August 3, 2023 is attached hereto as **Exhibit "O"**.

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32. If, indeed, the Plaintiff has sustained any injuries, damages, or losses, which is denied, the Defendants state that such injuries, damages, and losses relate to incidents which predate or postdate those described in the Plaintiff's Claim, and for which the Defendants bear no responsibility.

No Merit to the Plaintiff's Claim

- 33. The Plaintiff's Claim is without any merit whatsoever.
- 34. The Plaintiff is not genuinely upset about the allegedly defamatory comments. He has consistently used the July 25 Podcast as an opportunity for publicity.
- 35. The Plaintiff has described this litigation as "lawfare", and on August 7, 2023 posted the following message on Telegram: "I've never sued anyone before, let alone numerous people. Might as well do all the lawfare at the same time. Who doesn't like learning new skills?" A copy of the Plaintiff's Telegram message as published on August 7, 2023 is attached hereto as **Exhibit "P"**.
- 36. The Defendants plead that the allegedly defamatory statements published by the Defendants relate to matters of public interest and the Plaintiff has commenced this action as a means of unduly limiting expression on matters of public interest. In this regard, the Defendants rely on sections 137.1 of the *Courts of Justice Act*, R.S.O. 1990, c. C.43.
- 37. The Defendants also plead and rely upon the following statutes and the amendments thereto:
 - a. the Libel and Slander Act, R.S.O. 1990, c. L.12;
 - b. the Negligence Act, R.S.O. 1990, c. N. 1; and
 - c. the Courts of Justice Act, R.S.O. 1990, c. 43.
- 38. The Defendants request that the Plaintiff's Claim be dismissed with costs awarded to the Defendants on a substantial indemnity basis.

When Alberta RCMP released images of the weapons and tactical gear^[2] seized from a group that took part in the Coutts, Alta., border blockade, the pictures showed patches displaying a white diagonal line on a black background -- the calling card of the Diagolon far-right extremist group.

Four men associated with the Coutts blockade have been charged with allegedly plotting to kill RCMP police officers, but the Mounties have not yet publicly commented on any possible connections with the group.

Without naming any specific group, Public Safety Minister Marco Mendicino alluded to ties between protesters in Ottawa and the Coutts arrests while speaking to reporters Wednesday, saying "several of the individuals at Coutts have strong ties to a far-right extreme organization with leaders who are in Ottawa. We're talking about a group that is organized, agile, knowledgeable and driven by an extremist ideology where might makes right."

Mendicino appeared to double down on his remarks in Thursday's House of Commons session, saying "there is an ideologicallymotivated operation that we see in the rhetoric here that is meant to incite," which was one of the major reasons the government chose to invoke the Emergencies Act, he said.

WHAT IS THE DIAGOLON?

Diagolon can be categorized as an "accelerationist" group, according to researchers who study extremism.

Director of the Centre for Bias, Hate and Extremism at Ontario Tech University Barbara Perry defined accelerationism as the "intent on accelerating or fomenting a civil war, overturning what they see as the current corrupt, illegitimate order."

In an email to CTVNews.ca Thursday, Perry listed violent groups such as The Base, Atomwaffen[□], and the Boogalo Boys[□] as examples of adherents to that principle.

"For some, this resonates with the traditional RAHOWA, or Racial Holy War. For others, it represents an all-out civil war that would delegitimize and destabilize the current regime," Perry said in her email. "Many accelerationists celebrated the events of January 6, 2021 in Washington DC as the onset of this civil war (e.g., The Base), hence the calls...for the Freedom Convoy to be our January 6. Some of these groups/individuals are among the most aggressive and volatile elements of the far-right, and as we saw in Coutts, heavily armed."

WHERE DID DIAGOLON COME FROM?

The Diagolon group is a loose network of people with neo-fascist, militant views which emerged from a group of live streamers called "The Plaid Army," according to the Canadian Anti-Hate Network (CAHN).

The Plaid Army has been accused of platforming and espousing \square rampant racism and anti-Semitic \square content in their streams, and had a couple of mainstays on their shows including Jeremy MacKenzie, who has been identified by CAHN as the de facto leader of Diagolon in Canada.

MacKenzie, who is a Canadian military veteran, previously made headlines for protesting in Halifax[□] against a joint-speaking engagement of Romeo Dallaire and Omar Khadr about child soldiers, and more recently for his January arrest related to four weapons charges[□] after a video was posted on social media which police allege showed MacKenzie pointing a gun at a man's head. the blockades on his Telegram and YouTube channel where he goes by variations of the username "Raging Dissident \square "."

In one video posted by a user called "Raging Dissident III" which the CAHN says belongs to MacKenzie, the "Diagolon National Anthem," which appears to be a self-shot video of a Korean War memorial in Halifax and footage of a Canadian flag, wheat fields and the Diagolon flag is set to a version of "Rolling Down to Old Maui" by Stan Rogers and sung by Mannerbund, according to the CAHN, a group they identify as a U.S.-based white supremacist men's group.

The new lyrics reference that "by blood or sweat" the singers will reclaim their home, and if "there is no fire" to light their way they will start their own.

He is also the source of the concept of Diagolon, according to the CAHN, which started as an online joke referencing a fictional nation state of "sane" people who reject the current government and society, running diagonally across North America from Alaska to Florida.

WHAT ARE THE GROUP'S MOTIVATIONS?

In an email to CTVNews.ca Thursday, the CAHN said Diagolon is an excellent example of how irony poisoning ^[] can be used to warp an online joke into a movement.

Irony poisoning is a term used to describe the process of desensitization^[] to extremist, hateful rhetoric by the use of "humour," and especially on the internet -- memes -- that assist in sliding a person further into the spheres of fascism, white supremacy and violence.

The CAHN said in its email that Diagolon quickly attracted a network of like-minded anti-authority individuals, which they estimate are potentially now in the thousands, with members in Canada, the U.S. and Australia - judging from their Telegram channels.

"If you look at the Telegram channels and chats associated with these people, they all referred to Diagolon consistently," deputy director of CAHN Elizabeth Simons said in a telephone interview with CTVNews.ca Thursday. "They call themselves Diagolonians or Diags or Dags. People outside of Diagolon are called Circulonians because the rest of the rest of North America is what they call Circulon."

A perusal of Telegram channels of alleged Diagolon members or supporters shows support for the blockades in Ottawa, people posing with weapons and the sharing of violent images, including Prime Minister Justin Trudeau's head on a spike.

Simons pointed out that violence is a core element to Diagolon, citing MacKenzie's motto repeated in his chats and streams -- "by gun or rope" -- describing how his enemies can choose to die.

The CAHN stated in its email that the perceived enemies of the group are the media, the mainstream government and politicians and those they perceive as communists.

When asked why Diagolon targets communism, Simons said the fear of "encroaching communism" is rife amongst conspiracy theorist

movements as an insult against government policies, but in neofascist and militia movements it stands for something else.

"The fear of communism actually comes from Nazism and neo-Nazism where Communist is a placeholder for Jews," she said. "In neo-Nazi circles...that's why you see anti-Communist symbols and imagery amongst neo-Nazis and racist skinheads and things like that. So this idea of being opposed to communism in place of being opposed to Jews because it's a bit more palatable, goes back a long time."

For Diagolon, Simons said the term communist has morphed into "anyone that they don't like," or is their opposition. However, Simons pointed out there is a "massive contingent" of Diagolon members who are anti-Semitic and racist who likely use the term as the historicallyderived placeholder for Jewish people.

The major concern, Simons said, is that CAHN is witnessing the Diagolon network branch out and go offline.

"Those pictures of them about shooting together, the pictures of them training together, they get together and share knowledge, they're developing cells," she said, adding that despite MacKenzie being their de facto leader, cells and Diagolon member networks are autonomous. "Jeremy [MacKenzie] doesn't tell them what to do or how to act...and so after what happened in Alberta, we are worried about other potential cells and networks that could lead to violence."

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

RCMP investigating rape threat against Pierre Poilievre's wife

Far-right activist Jeremy MacKenzie made the comments in an online stream

The RCMP confirmed Monday that it is looking into a threat of sexual violence directed at Conservative Leader Pierre Poilievre's wife, Anaida Poilievre.

Poilievre denounced the threat from far-right political commentator Jeremy MacKenzie and said his office contacted law enforcement about the matter.

An RCMP spokesperson told CBC News Monday that it's looking into the report.

"We can confirm that the matter has been referred to the RCMP and we are reviewing the information provided," they said in an email.

"Only in the event that criminal charges are laid would the RCMP be in a position to confirm the nature of the complaint or any individuals allegedly involved."

Jeremy MacKenzie, the leader of the Canadian far-right group Diagolon, made the threats over the weekend in a stream on the social media app Telegram while speaking with a guest, Alex Vriend.

"Let's rape her," MacKenzie said. "It's not really a sex thing. It's like we just want to show people that we can do things to you if we want to. It's a power move."

MacKenzie made several racist and derogatory remarks about Anaida Poilievre's Venezuelan background in the stream.

Anaida Poilievre was born in Venezuela and grew up in Montreal. Pierre and Anaida married in 2017 and have two children. Pierre Poilievre was elected

Conservative leader earlier this month and Anaida Poilievre works as a political staffer on Parliament Hill.

In a statement posted to Twitter Monday, Poilievre said his office has contacted the RCMP about the comments.

"My office has referred these comments to the RCMP to assess whether criminal charges should be laid," he said in the statement.

Jenni Byrne, the head of Poilievre's transition team, told CBC News she called the RCMP on Saturday after she was made aware of the threat. Byrne said she would be meeting with the Mounties to discuss the situation.

"These men are dirtbags," Poilievre said in the statement. "Frankly, like most Canadians, until about a month ago I had never heard of Diagolon and these losers. They are all odious.

"This kind of garbage has no place in Canada. No one should face this abuse.

"People can attack my politics, they can call me names, they can protest my ideas and what I stand for. But threatening my wife and family is appalling and I will not tolerate it. Leave my family alone."

In an interview with The Canadian Press, MacKenzie said he was drinking when he made the comments and meant no harm by them.

Politicians, journalists and other public figures — especially women and people of colour — have been facing an increase in acts of harassment and threats in recent months.

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Prime Minister Justin Trudeau denounced threats and hatred in response to a reporter's question Monday. He didn't mention Poilievre specifically.

"No one should ever be subject to threats of violence or the kind of hatred that we've seen increasingly in the public discourse, in the public sphere," Trudeau told a news conference.

"It's important that we all stand up and condemn that, and we all look for ways to ensure that everyone feels safe in this country."

NDP Leader Jagmeet Singh also denounced the threat.

"No one should be threatened with sexual violence. Not journalists, not politicians, not anyone's family, not anyone," Singh said in a tweet Monday.

He called on political leaders to work at stopping violent extremism.

"The rise of violent extremism in Canada should be a concern for all leaders. If there's political will, we can do something to stop it," he said.

Mark Gerretsen, a Liberal member of Parliament representing Kingston and the Islands, tweeted Monday that he also received a sexual assault threat directed at his Toronto Superior Court of Justice / Cour supérieure de justice "Investigating rape unear against Fiene Fonevies whe food interves

wife. He posted the message in his tweet and said both Kingston Police and the Parliamentary Protective Service have opened files on it.

"I 100% agree with Pierre Poilievre on this," Gerrettsen said in the tweet. "Attack me all you want. Leave our families out of this."

Who is Jeremy MacKenzie?

MacKenzie, who is 36, has attracted attention for his support of the anti-vaccine mandate convoy protest which occupied Ottawa earlier this year, and for his leadership of far-right group Diagolon.

A spokesperson for the Department of National Defence told CBC in an email that MacKenzie served in the Canadian Armed Forces. They said MacKenzie enrolled in 2003 and released in 2017, adding he was an infantryman with the Royal Canadian Regiment and that he had one deployment to Afghanistan.

An Instagram account bearing MacKenzie's name describes him as a "Sub-Standard podcaster, Sit-down comedian Super Villain, Sardonic Emperor of Diagolon, Very Scary."

The Saskatchewan RCMP charged MacKenzie in July with assault, pointing a firearm, using a restricted weapon in a careless manner and mischief. Nova Scotia RCMP charged MacKenzie with 13 gun-related charges in June.

Barbara Perry, director of the Centre on Hate, Bias and Extremism at Ontario Tech University, said that Diagolon aims to establish a "white ethnonationalist state" which would run diagonally from the Pacific Northwest through Canada to Florida.

Perry said her group started to look into Diagolon after police in Coutts, Alta., found the group's patch on body armour while executing a search warrant. Two men arrested in relation to border blockades in Coutts in February have ties to MacKenzie and Diagolon.

"So the idea is ... to accelerate some form of civil war," Perry said. "[MacKenzie] feels, and some of his followers believe, that we are already in the midst of a racial war in which white men, in particular, are losing, so it's time for them to stand up and fight back.

"So they would like to 'accelerate' that civil war, if you will, and replace the current order with this white ethnonationalist state."

Perry said that while Diagolon lacks concrete plans, the group's narrative is violent and aggressive — and may inspire violence.

"The narratives themselves are dangerous because of the potential consequences," she said.

Perry said that MacKenzie may have seen Anaida Poilievre's ethnicity and gender, as well the fact that she has children with Pierre, as an opportunity to highlight his racist, misogynist narrative.

Poilievre shook hands with MacKenzie at an event in August. In a statement issued to Global News, he denied knowing MacKenzie.

"My campaign events are public. There is no registration and anyone can walk in ... It is impossible to do a background check on every single person who attends my events," Poilievre said in the statement. "As I always have, I denounce racism and anyone who spreads it."

Perry said MacKenzie also may have threatened Poilievre because of Poilievre's new status as leader of the opposition.

"So now, to the extent that Poilievre is the leader of a primary political party in Canada, he is now part of the machinery. He is, because of that leadership role, part of the state to which [Diagolon is] so opposed," Perry said.

Right-wing activist says he meant no harm with 'joke' about raping Pierre Poilievre's wife

Jeremy MacKenzie, the leader of an online community called Diagolon, says he was drunk when he joked about sexually assaulting the Conservative leader's wife during a live broadcast on Friday.

OTTAWA — The RCMP is reviewing a statement from a prominent far-right figure who says he was drunk when he joked during a live broadcast about sexually assaulting Conservative Leader Pierre Poilievre's wife.

The comment provoked Poilievre's strongest condemnation yet of a group called Diagolon and its controversial leader Jeremy MacKenzie, a 36-year-old Nova Scotia man whose online community has been linked to misinformation, antisemitism and racism.

MacKenzie, who has been charged with weapons and assault offences, rejects evidence of ties between his followers and an alleged plot to kill police officers during last winter's so-called "Freedom Convoy" blockade in southern Alberta.

Poilievre had previously sidestepped calls to denounce MacKenzie, including from leadership rival Jean Charest, after the men were photographed together at an event during the Conservative leadership race this summer.

Poilievre's campaign also condemned what it called an "attack" from a Global News reporter, who asked questions about MacKenzie's views after Poilievre briefly joined an army reservist marching across Canada to protest COVID-19 vaccination mandates. The marching reservist had appeared on, and expressed admiration for, MacKenzie's "Raging Dissident" podcast.

On Monday, however, Poilievre lambasted MacKenzie after the Diagolon leader discussed sexually assaulting Anaida Poilievre during a livestreamed broadcast over the weekend.

"These men are dirtbags. Frankly, like most Canadians, until about a month ago I had never heard of Diagolon and these losers. They are all odious," Poilievre said in a statement posted on Twitter.

The Conservative leader also said his office had referred the comments to the RCMP.

"This kind of garbage has no place in Canada. No one should face this abuse," Poilievre's statement continued.

"People can attack my politics, they can call me names, they can protest my ideas and what I stand for. But threatening my wife and family is appalling and I will not tolerate it. Leave my family alone."

The RCMP confirmed Monday it is reviewing information provided by Poilievre's office.

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"Only in the event that criminal charges are laid would the RCMP be in a position to confirm the nature of the complaint or any individuals allegedly involved," it said in an emailed statement to the Star.

A video circulating on social media shows MacKenzie discussing Poilievre's wife with other men in an online forum. After MacKenzie comments on her appearance and where she's from, he says, "Let's rape her ... It's not really a sex thing, we just want to show people that we can do things to you if we want to. It's a power move."

In an interview by phone on Monday, MacKenzie told the Star he only vaguely recalled making the comment — which he described as a "joke" — because he was drinking alcohol during the discussion. MacKenzie said he thinks it's "beneath" Poilievre as Conservative leader to formally condemn a comment from such a venue, and accused him of "political posturing."

He also said he did not mean to be threatening or offensive, and that he's sorry if his comments were taken that way.

"I feel bad if he or his wife or anyone is offended or upset. That wasn't the intent," MacKenzie said.

"I would hope he'd be a bigger man than that and have some thicker skin than that if he's going to be prime minister, but obviously I would never condone something like that," he added.

The incident comes amid rising concern about death threats and violent rhetoric aimed at public figures. Politicians have <u>spoken</u> about carrying panic buttons and beefing up security at their family homes. Journalists have also faced <u>threats and attempted</u> intimidation that has targeted racialized female reporters in particular, including at the Star.

MacKenzie himself has directed rage towards the media, stating to more than 13,000 followers on his "Raging Dissident" Telegram channel this summer that journalists have caused "irreparable" damage to society. "I hope the torment they receive as a reward for their service to evil is so overwhelming it inevitably ends them," the statement said.

It's also not the first time Poilievre has voiced disgust about threats to his wife. In late August, after Deputy Prime Minister Chrystia Freeland was accosted by an aggressive man during a visit to Alberta, Poilievre told reporters he had hired private security to protect his family.

Asked about MacKenzie's comments, Prime Minister Justin Trudeau told a news conference on Parliament Hill that "no one should ever be subject to threats of violence or the kind of hatred we've seen increasingly ... It's important that we all stand up and condemn that."

MacKenzie, a founding member of the People's Party of Canada, was a prominent figure in far-right media online during the socalled "Freedom Convoy" protests that gridlocked Ottawa streets and sparked border blockades last winter.

Researchers at the Canadian Anti-Hate Network have described him as the de facto leader of Diagolon, an online community they report has provided a platform for propagating views about the desire to speed up the collapse of society — an idea labelled "<u>militant</u> accellerationism."

The researchers also said discourse from the Diagolon community includes the promotion of Holocaust denial, conspiracy theories about COVID-19, and the sharing of neo-Nazi and white supremacist propaganda. MacKenzie rejects this as unfair, and says he is primarily concerned about divisions in Canadian society, a seeming intolerance for opposing views and economic problems.

Diagolon gained mainstream attention in February when patches bearing the Diagolon symbol were discovered with a cache of guns and body armour seized near a "freedom" blockade at a border crossing in southern Alberta. Fourteen people were arrested after the RCMP alleged some protesters were willing to use force if police moved against the blockade. Four of them were <u>charged</u> with conspiracy to commit murder.

The father of Chris Lysak, one of the men accused in the alleged plot, <u>told the Star</u> after the arrests that his son became radicalized online, including through engagement with Diagolon.

MacKenzie was charged last month with assault, pointing a firearm, mischief and use of a restricted weapon following an incident last year in Saskatchewan. He was also charged earlier this year after Mounties allegedly <u>found</u> restricted guns, a prohibited ammunition magazine, body armour and bullets at his Nova Scotia home, The Canadian Press reported.

Speaking to the Star on Monday, MacKenzie dismissed the charges as baseless and "contrived." Although he acknowledged having met Lysak at least once, MacKenzie also denied any responsibility or link to the alleged plot during the blockade in Alberta, and rejected the notion that he bears responsibility for the views, statements or actions of his followers.

"I can't control how someone else interprets my feelings," he said.

1 MR. SHERIF FODA: Absolutely. Thank you, Mr. 2 Commissioner. 3 COMMISSIONER ROULEAU: Okay. So, Mr. MacKenzie, 4 we're ready to go. Commissioner Counsel, go ahead. 5 Thank you, Mr. Commissioner. 6 MR. JOHN MATHER: 7 --- EXAMINATION-IN-CHIEF BY MR. JOHN MATHER: 8 MR. JOHN MATHER: Good afternoon, Mr. MacKenzie, 9 can you hear me? 10 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir. MR. JOHN MATHER: My name is John Mather. I'm 11 one of the Commission Counsel. You are appearing today via 12 videoconference from the Saskatoon Correctional Centre; is that 13 correct? 14 15 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: That's correct. 16 MR. JOHN MATHER: And we understand that you're 17 being held in relation to charges in a matter that is unrelated 18 to the protest in Ottawa and Coutts; is that correct? 19 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: That is correct. MR. JOHN MATHER: The Commission understands that 20 21 you are from Nova Scotia; is that correct? 22 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir. 23 MR. JOHN MATHER: And where did you grow up? MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I grew up in Pictou 24 25 County, Nova Scotia. 26 MR. JOHN MATHER: And we understand that you were 27 a member of the Canadian Armed Forces? MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: That is correct, from 2017 28

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1 -- or, sorry, 2003 until 2017. 2 MR. JOHM MATHER: And what rank did you achieve 3 in the Armed Forces? 4 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I retired as a Master 5 Corporal. MR. JOHN MATHER: And you have produced a letter 6 7 through your Counsel to the Commission and it's a letter that 8 you sent to the Senate. Do you know what I'm referring to? 9 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I believe so, yes. 10 MR. JOHN MATHER: So if we could pull up 11 JMK0000003? Mr. MacKenzie, can you first just let me know if 12 you can see the document on the screen and you're able to read 13 14 what it says? 15 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, I can. MR. JOHN MATHER: Okay. Thank you. And is --16 this is a letter that's entitled Diagolon's List of Demands to 17 18 the Canadian Senate. Do you see that? 19 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes. 20 MR. JOHN MATHER: Okay, and I'll ask you some questions about Diagolon in a moment. 21 22 And can you just confirm for us... If we can scroll down to the bottom. 23 24 ... just again for the Commission's benefit, but 25 also potentially yours, we see that it has a signature block for 26 you at the bottom. And there's no signature here. Do you know if you ever signed this letter? 27 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No, I sent it digitally to 28

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1 the Senate members. 2 MR. JOHN MATHER: Okay. And do you recall when 3 you sent it to the Senate? 4 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: It was several days before 5 the Emergency Act was revoked by the government approximately --6 7 MR. JOHN MATHER: And sorry, and with the audio I 8 just didn't catch that. Did you say before it was invoked or 9 revoked? 10 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Before it was revoked by the government, perhaps three days, three, four days. 11 MR. JOHN MATHER: Thank you. 12 We can take the letter down. 13 14 But Mr. MacKenzie, I'm going to ask you some questions, and if you need to look at the letter just let me 15 know; okay? 16 17 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes. 18 MR. JOHN MATHER: In the letter to the Senate, 19 you describe yourself as a podcaster and a comedian. I take it 20 that's accurate? MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, it is. 21 22 MR. JOHN MATHER: And it's the Commission's understanding that you podcast under the name Raging Dissident; 23 is that correct? 24 25 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes. 26 MR. JOHN MATHER: And at one time you had a 27 YouTube channel; is that correct? 28 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes.

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1 MR. JOHN MATHER: And do you know at -- do you know how many followers that YouTube channel had? 2 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I have had several that 3 4 have been removed by YouTube for various reasons. Several times it's been 10,000, 12,000. I think the highest may have been 12, 5 13,000. 6 7 MR. JOHN MATHER: And you also have a Telegram 8 channel? 9 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir. MR. JOHN MATHER: And how many followers have you 10 had? I appreciate you were giving some ranges there on your 11 Telegram channel. 12 13 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Roughly, I would say upwards to around 14,000. 14 MR. JOHN MATHER: And on the YouTube and Telegram 15 channel are you positing under the name Raging Dissident? 16 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes. 17 18 MR. JOHN MATHER: And I understand that you also 19 have an Instagram account using the name Raging Dissident; is 20 that correct? MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, I do. 21 22 MR. JOHN MATHER: And are there any other social 23 media that you use? 24 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Those are the primary --25 Rumble as well is another video-sharing website. Primarily 26 those are the ones I use most heavily. I also have a personal 27 page that I typically just use for advertising links and so on on Facebook, Gab, and -- yeah, I believe that's it. 28

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1 MR. JOHN MATHER: And what's the URL for that 2 personal website? 3 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: My own personal .com 4 website? MR. JOHN MATHER: Yeah, the one you were just 5 6 referencing. 7 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Oh, I have a -- I just 8 have a Facebook page, there's a Rumble website URL, but my 9 personal website is ragingdissident.com. 10 MR. JOHN MATHER: Thank you. And do you use the 11 messaging service Slack to communicate? MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No. 12 MR. JOHN MATHER: Have you ever used Slack? 13 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No, I've never heard of 14 15 it. In the letter to the Senate, MR. JOHN MATHER: 16 you identify yourself as a founding member of the People's Party 17 18 of Canada. Is that correct? 19 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes. The -- when the 20 party was stood up it required a certain amount of signatures to register federally, I believe maybe 250, 500, something in that 21 22 range. Mr. Bernier put out a request for people that wanted to support his platform and see a party created to fill out the 23 form and sign it and mail it into the appropriate address, which 24 I did. 25 26 MR. JOHN MATHER: Right. And you describe 27 yourself as an enthusiastic supporter of the party then? 28 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I wouldn't go as far as

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1 enthusiastic, but I am a supporter, yes. 2 MR. JOHN MATHER: Okay. So if we could pull up the letter to the Senate again, JMK3, and if we could scroll --3 4 zoom in please. And just give me a moment. And continue scrolling down. Continue scrolling down, please. Stop there. 5 It says here in your letter, Mr. MacKenzie: 6 7 "I am also a founding member of the People's Party of Canada and 8 9 enthusiastically supported the party through my social media." 10 11 So would you at least agree with me that you enthusiastically support the People's Party of Canada through 12 your social media? 13 14 Oh. Is the -- it appears we're having some technical difficulties, so if everyone could bear with us for a 15 moment. 16 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: We lost the audio. 17 Hello? 18 I can't hear anything. Hello? 19 MR. JOHN MATHER: So the technical team said that 20 it'll be five minutes to resolve the issue, Mr. Commissioner. 21 COMMISSIONER ROULEAU: Okay, we'll take a fiveminute break and then come back. 22 (TECHNICAL ISSUES/AUDIO ISSUES) 23 THE REGISTRAR: The Commission is in recess for 5 24 minutes, la commission lever pour 5 minutes. 25 26 --- Upon recessing at 2:20 p.m. --- Upon resuming at 2:29 p.m. 27 --- MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE, Resumed: 28

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1	THE REGISTRAR: The Commissioned is reconvened.
2	La Commission reprend.
3	EXAMNIATION IN-CHIEF BY. MR. JOHN MATHER, (cont'd):
4	MR. JOHN MATHER: Mr. MacKenzie, can you hear me
5	right now?
6	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir.
7	MR. JOHN MATHER: Okay, thank you, and I can hear
8	you. And apologies for the technical difficulty and I
9	appreciate your patience while we sort it out.
10	Before we got cut off and I'm not sure when
11	you last heard me I had asked you whether or not you were an
12	enthusiastic supporter of the Peoples Party of Canada and you
13	suggested it wasn't necessarily enthusiastic. I had then pulled
14	up the letter that you'd sent to the Senate in which say and
15	hopefully you can see it that you're a founding member and
16	you:
17	"enthusiastically supported the party
18	through my social media, public
19	speaking, and attending events held by
20	Maxime Bernier as well as personal
21	friends, Mark Friesen and Randy
22	Hillier."
23	Do you see that?
24	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir.
25	MR. JOHN MATHER: And so I take it you agree with
26	me that you were an enthusiastic supporter at least to the
27	extent you wrote that in the letter to the senate?
28	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Correct. I misinterpreted

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1 the question. I thought it maybe, perhaps, meant "at the current time". I haven't been really involved in any party 2 3 politics since around this time. And in -- as it pertains to 4 the letter and "enthusiastically", I guess I was referring to throughout the previous federal election that had just 5 transpired in the fall. 6 7 MR. JOHN MATHER: And on your -- and you 8 mentioned earlier that you are a podcaster. The Commission also 9 understands that these podcasts are often videotaped as well, and the video is streamed; is that fair? 10 11 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: That's correct. MR. JOHN MATHER: So it's not just an audio 12 format when you talk about a podcast? 13 14 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No, it's both. I usually extrapolate the audio and then upload it after to several 15 streaming platforms for typical -- more typical podcasting 16 17 consumption. 18 MR. JOHN MATHER: And on your podcasts, I take it 19 you -- would you agree that you're outspoken about your 20 criticism of the federal government? MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir. 21 22 MR. JOHN MATHER: Okay. And you're also outspoken about your criticism of the RCMP? 23 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes. 24 25 MR. JOHN MATHER: And you were, as a general 26 matter, opposed to the Covid-19 public health mandates that were 27 imposed by the federal government? 28 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: In general, yes.

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MR. JOHN MATHER: Okay. And with respect to the
 RCMP, as I understand it, you've been critical of how they
 handled the mass casualty event in Portapique, NS, in 2020; is
 that fair?

MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir. Several days 5 after that event had taken place, I had reached out to some 6 people that I knew in the area and tried to get a sense of --7 before I just, you know, started speaking haphazardly without 8 really having any -- you know, as much information as I could. 9 And then I released a video on YouTube which garnered, roughly, 10 11 anywhere between 500,000 to a million views across various platforms in the following week. 12

13 MR. JOHN MATHER: I'm now going to ask you some 14 questions about Diagolon. Again, referring back to the letter 15 you sent to the Senate, you explained to them that Diagolon is a 16 fictional country. Is that -- at least that's how it -- it's 17 origin; is that fair?

18

MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir.

MR. JOHN MATHER: Right. And from the material the Commission's reviewed, Diagolon, the origin of it was something you drew on your phone when you drew a line of -- over the continent of North America from the southeast to the northwest of the continent; am I describing that correctly?

24 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes. So the concept was 25 born out of a -- sort a long kind of stream of consciousness. I 26 do a lot of analytical commentary on current events, politics, 27 these kinds of things. At the time, I believe it was January 28 2021, the -- I observed, as many others had, Mid-Western United

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1 States, Texas, Florida, South Dakota, and so on, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Alaska geographically formed sort of an oblique 2 line that were resistant to or handling the Covid-19 approach in 3 4 a different way. These are traditionally conservative areas in Canada, Republican in the United States, so we, you know, kind 5 of found it amusing that there was this kind of geographically 6 divide, almost, that you could find on a map and, you know, it 7 became sort of joke that if this was a pretend, you know, a kind 8 9 of parallel universe, a different world, and so on, and that's how the concept was born. 10

11 The flag you're referencing is what I created in the weeks following on my phone just as kind of a -- as a 12 mechanism for branding symbolism kind of thing for, you know, 13 14 community members and it started to become synonymous with myself and the podcast kind of as a -- as I quess a branding 15 mechanism that people would, you know, display and they could 16 buy patches, stickers, and things like this to basically denote 17 18 that they're a fan of mine.

MR. JOHN MATHER: So -- and I take it from reading your letter to the Senate and what you just said, you don't take any issue and you agree that you are associated with Diagolon and the Diagolon flag?

23 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, it came out of my
 24 imaginations, yes.

25 MR. JOHN MATHER: Yeah, okay. And you talk about 26 -- you mention there -- I think you said it began as a bit of a 27 joke. But as I understand it, that joke has now elolved into an 28 international community of your podcast fans; is that fair?

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1 **MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE:** Yes. It's also fairly synonymous with another thing that's been reference, the, you 2 know, so-called "Plaid Army", which was several -- me and 3 4 several other guys were just having a conversation one day and we all had similar shirts on. Someone made a joke about, you 5 know, "What is this, the Plaid Army?" So it was kind of -- that 6 7 evolved into this. It's the essentially the same thing. It's the same group of people and it's a just, again, kind of 8 branding mechanism, a way for -- to unite community followers 9 10 and so on.

MR. JOHN MATHER: Right, and you specifically reference in your letter to the Senate that it has created an international community of your podcast fans; is that correct?

MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: Yes, there are followers
and fans in the United States, some in Europe, Australia.

16 MR. JOHN MATHER: And as I understand from your 17 letter that these -- this community engages in regional meet and 18 greets, barbeques, and family gatherings?

19 MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: Yes, correct. Sometime in 20 the summer of 2021, I believe, we tried to host it in -- just, people wanted to come out and have kind of a meet and greet with 21 myself and some other guys, and we had, as I said, a barbeque, 22 you know, had some drinks, the guys were playing guitars, and so 23 I observed that there was a few dozen people that came from 24 on. as far away as British Columbia, Ontario, even in Saskatchewan, 25 26 and it struck me as in this time of a lot of people feel very 27 isolated and depressed. A lot of them expressed to me how much 28 this meant for them to feel as though they had some kind of

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connection and kinship with other people that felt the same way
 as they did about the future and shared their fears and
 concerns.

4 So and I just observed how much it seemed to help them, heal them, and make them happy. So I began what I called 5 a "find your friends" campaign. So I used -- using my online 6 presence and my telegram channel and so on, set up kind of 7 regional areas or chat channels to facilitate my -- I mean, not 8 9 everyone can come all the way to Saskatchewan from PEI, Newfoundland, or so on. So if there's people that are like 10 minded, that are in your area that share this, they're a fan of 11 my podcast and so on and would like to meet each other and share 12 in this kind of activity, then you can do so this way. I was 13 just trying to create a -- you know, an avenue for them to 14 pursue, and I encouraged people to do that rather than sitting 15 at home looking a their screens and you know, being fed, you 16 know, fear and what I believe is a lot of toxic messaging on the 17 18 media and television and so on. And I thought it would be good 19 for people to get out and have real, face-to-face human 20 interactions and relationships again. And I thought it would be beneficial to their mental health, and I saw that they would --21 there were good things coming from that, so I encouraged people 22 to do so. 23

MR. JOHN MATHER: And you mentioned a first or an initial barbeque in either the summer of 2020, 2021. After that have you attended personally any of these other meet and greets that you encouraged people to participate in?

28 MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: There was one other one in

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Saskatchewan that I was present. There was another party sort
 of barbeque in Ontario in perhaps April of this year, and there
 was another gathering outside the City of Ottawa during the
 convoy period of time in February.

5 MR. JOHN MATHER: And are there other former6 Canadian Forces members in the Diagolon community?

7 MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: Yes, there are. I've 8 often incorporated a lot of my commentary, my unique, I suppose 9 you could say, kind of lived experiences through and true to military, my -- how I deal with my -- you know, the inherent 10 11 trauma and so on that comes with that. It has gathered a -- it has attracted a fair amount of other veterans and military 12 personnel because they resonate with the things I'm saying when 13 they -- I'm speaking to something that they can understand or 14 identify with, so there is a fair number. I couldn't hazard a 15 number specifically, but a sizeable portion of the community, 16 especially early on where other guys that knew me from work or 17 18 so on but kind of spread through the areas, because I'm an 19 outspoken guy, right, and so on.

20 MR. JOHN MATHER: Do members of the Diagolon
21 community ever refer to themselves as bigots?

22 MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: Yes, they do. This was my 23 doing to try and kind of take power out of the word, as it was 24 being used as a slur, as a sign or as a defamatory method 25 towards people like me and my followers and fans and so on. 26 So we just kind of adopted it as a tongue in 27 cheek kind of defiant way of shrugging it off as because it

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doesn't bother us that these people are -- you know, actually,

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1 if it doesn't bother me, it shouldn't bother them and they shouldn't care what, you know, these people think. They should 2 let -- allow them to, you know, attack them this way and get 3 4 under their skin and make them feel bad just because they are who they are and they like who they like. 5 MR. JOHN MATHER: So you and your followers were 6 being called bigots? It didn't bother you and so as a way to 7 show it didn't bother you, you embraced it and identify 8 9 yourselves now as bigots? 10 MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: In a tongue in cheek kind 11 of sarcastic tone, yes. MR. JOHN MATHER: And is that sort of tongue in 12 cheek sarcastic tone consistent with the sort of comedy that you 13 perform on your podcasts? 14 MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: I would say yes, I'm a 15 fairly sarcastic person, yes. 16 MR. JOHN MATHER: And we already -- you already 17 18 mentioned the Diagolon symbol or flag, and I'm going to pull it up just to confirm everyone can see what we're talking about. 19 20 If we can pull up COM906? And again, Mr. Mackenzie, at any time, if you 21 can't see anything that I put up on the screen, just let me 22 23 know. 24 MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: Okay. 25 MR. JOHN MATHER: So is that you in this photograph that's on the screen? 26 27 MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: Yes, it is. This was at 28 one of the gatherings, I believe, outside Ottawa, sometime in

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1 February. This is a still image from a video that was taken. I was standing on top of a table addressing the people that had 2 arrived and attended and was just simply thanking them for 3 showing up and encouraging them to keep taking care of each 4 other and you know, I hope you had a good time, and so on. 5 MR. JOHN MATHER: And fair to say that the flag 6 7 in the background, that's a Diagolon flag? 8 MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: Yes. 9 MR. JOHN MATHER: Okay. And the Commission understands that on February 15th, 2022, you said in a video 10 11 that you could not wait until that flag is seen as a -- or is described as a hate symbol? Do you know what I'm talking about? 12 MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: Yes. Again, I was being 13 kind of tongue in cheek, in a way, because the people that I 14 believe are deciding what is and what is not is a hate symbol 15 are incredibly disingenuous and you know, kind of smear 16 merchants. 17 It was -- would have been kind of a gotcha trophy 18 19 over them, not as actually in a serious manner displayed as a 20 hate symbol, but more of an achievement that kind of lured them in more to focus on myself. 21 22 MR. JOHN MATHER: And do you see -- and I take it then, that this is another sort of part of your comedy, wanting 23 this to be called a hate symbol? 24 MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: Yes. 25 It's because it's 26 again, no one in my community would be surprised to hear me saying these things, and it certainly isn't a symbol of hatred, 27 but we find it amusing that our, I guess enemies, if you could 28

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1 say, do believe this and believe these absurd claims of ours, and it's just kind of an inside joke at this point. 2 MR. JOHN MATHER: You sell Diagolon merchandise; 3 4 is that right? MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: I personally -- I have a 5 shop that has just recently gone online in the past two or three 6 months. Previously, other friends of mine offered, like, the 7 8 flags, for example, another man was selling patches he was 9 making at cost just to help promote community visibility and give people something to -- I thought it would be nice if some 10 11 people had something to hold in their hand and kind of have them -- bring them some attachment and just something for them to 12 enjoy in this way. 13 14 MR. JOHN MATHER: So the people who were selling the merchandise, they were friends of yours? 15 MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: Yes. 16 MR. JOHN MATHER: They sold it with your 17 18 approval? 19 MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: Yes, they did. 20 MR. JOHN MATHER: And they are also part of the Diagolon community? 21 22 MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: They would likely identify as fans of mine, and yes. However, as you can probably observe, 23 it's not a particularly complicate thing to reproduce, so I 24 don't -- it's not a copyrighted symbol by any means. There's no 25 26 real official ownership to it as of yet, so people would just approach me and -- of their own voluntary intention, and ask 27 like, "Hey, do you mind if I make this or make that and sell 28

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1 this," you know, whoever. 2 I would say, "No, go ahead. If it gives you something to do, if you can make a few dollars from it and it 3 4 helps you, then by all means." MR. JOHN MATHER: Right. It's not a nuanced 5 symbol, is it, in terms of its design? 6 7 MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: No, it's essentially just 8 a black square and I used my finger on my phone to do this about 9 three times with a white paint maker selection, and as you can see, it's kind of an irregular -- it's not perfectly straight 10 11 lines. They're kind of irregular and it's basically just my finger doing this a couple of times. And I sent that image fill 12 off to be produced further. 13 So if someone wanted to show 14 MR. JOHN MATHER: themselves as someone who supported your podcasts or supported 15 the Diagolon community, it would be fairly easy for them to 16 replicate the Diagolon flag; is that fair? 17 18 MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: I would assume so, yes. 19 It's not difficult to -- it looks fairly simple. 20 MR. JOHN MATHER: So Mr. Mackenzie, I think what I'm about to say will not come as a surprise to you, but in 21 22 fairness, I want to ask you some questions about it. The RCMP has described you in documents the 23 Commission has received -- sorry, I should step it back -- the 24 RCMP has described Diagolon let me be specific, has described 25 26 Diagolon as a militia-like network with members that are armed 27 and preparing for violence. The RCMP has also described Diagolon as having supporters that express sentiments akin to 28

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1 accelerationism, viewing a coming collapse or civil war as 2 necessary to right the course of the country. 3 In your letter to the Senate, you denied those 4 sorts of allegations. Is that fair? 5 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir. MR. JOHN MATHER: Yeah. And in the letter to the 6 Senate, you said that you are under RCMP scrutiny because of the 7 8 criticisms that you've made about the RCMP and as I understand 9 reading your letter, but please correct me if I'm wrong, I understand it -- I understand you to be saying that the RCMP 10 11 sort of is looking at you closely because of the way you criticized them and that's why they're saying these sorts of 12 things about you. 13 14 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: That is my personal 15 belief, yes. There is a -- many, many of the followers in the 16 17 vans and so on are, you can say, conservative Canadians. 18 There's an aspect of, you know, firearms, supporting recreational culture and stuff, especially in western Canada, 19 20 but there's certainly not anything resembling a militia, right, to this extent. 21 22 MR. JOHN MATHER: Moving away from what the RCMP says about Diagolon, I appreciate you wouldn't have been able to 23 watch the testimony, but we had Superintendent Patrick Morris, 24 who is the head of the OPP's Intelligence Bureau, testify. He's 25 26 not a member of the RCMP and he testified at the inquiry that Diagolon is an extremist entity that holds extremist views. 27 I assume you also disagree with that statement. 28

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MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir. It's my, again, 1 belief and assertion that much of this narrative is coming from 2 certain actors and members of the media. The Canadian Anti-Hate 3 4 Network and so on has Astro-turfed and kind of laid the foundation of this -- this idea. They've been certainly paying 5 me a lot of attention over the past few years and through 6 7 personal disclosure documents of mine through various legal 8 proceedings, it's been revealed that the police are actually 9 relying upon articles, if you can call them that, by the Canadian Anti-Hate Network as open source intelligence, so 10 11 they're relying upon what these people are saying about me as, you know, taking it at face value. 12

MR. JOHN MATHER: But to be fair, Mr. MacKenzie,
you don't know what the RCMP or the OPP are relying on in their
entirety when they make these assessments, do you?

16

MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Correct.

MR. JOHN MATHER: I was going to ask you about
two terms, one of which was the plaid army, but thank you,
you've already explained that, so we can save that question.

The next term that we've seen a reference to is a term that you've used sometimes called "the beach", and it is our understanding, but again, you can correct me if I'm wrong, that when -- sometimes when you reference "the beach", you're referencing D-Day in World War II. Is that accurate?

25 MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: Yes. It comes from a line 26 in a movie I enjoy, "Saving Private Ryan". There's a line in it 27 -- in that film right before the landing craft descend upon 28 Omaha Beach, I believe, where Tom Hanks' character says, "I'll

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1	see you on the beach". It's kind of a reassuring I will be
2	there with you kind of sentiment, so I say this, again, as kind
3	of and you know, my followers are familiar with this. I
4	explained it several times.
5	But that's just kind of a callback to that film
6	and expressing a sentiment that, you know, whatever's
7	transpiring in the future will I will be there with you to
8	support you and guys can support each other and so on.
9	It's just a message of encouragement, I suppose.
10	MR. JOHN MATHER: You attended the protest in
11	Ottawa in January and February 2022?
12	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir.
13	MR. JOHN MATHER: And you attended them with
14	other members of the Diagolon community?
15	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, I did.
16	MR. JOHN MATHER: When did you arrive in Ottawa?
17	MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: I can't be certain of the
18	exact date, but it was one or perhaps two days before the main
19	body of the of the trucks arrived. I believe it was a Friday
20	evening they showed up. So maybe perhaps that Thursday or
21	Wednesday.
22	MR. JOHN MATHER: So you knew the convoy was
23	coming to Ottawa and that's why you showed up?
24	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, I did. I observed
25	the it was very clear to me by monitoring social media and so
26	on as part of what I do to comment on social you know,
27	current events and, you know, analyze political commentary, that
28	kind of thing, that this was going to be a very significant

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1 event. It was very clear to me this was not going to be an in and out, you know, weekend protest type of thing. 2 There was videos of long, long -- very long 3 4 convoys of trucks and vehicles. They were coming in from There were open group chats or voice chats 5 multiple directions. and stuff where these people were communicating back and forth 6 7 you could listen in on. 8 It was clear this was going to be a pretty big 9 deal, so I -- again, this was going to be something I would be talking about, that would have a lot of my attention anyway, so 10 11 I decided why not go and get a close look at it as it transpired rather than watch it from -- you know, relying on other sources 12 from home to understand what was happening. 13 14 MR. JOHN MATHER: Right. And it attracted your attention because the stated purpose of the truckers coming to 15 Ottawa was to end the federal COVI-19 mandates, and that's a 16 political view you also held; right? 17 18 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: That seemed to be one of their primary motivations, yes. There was a lot of other --19 20 that was one of the main factors. 21 There was a lot of other discontent in various groups. It wasn't -- it wasn't a monolithic that was the only 22 objective for people. Again, there was very -- not really any 23 hierarchy or any real organization that I could observe. 24 Ιt seemed like just a grassroots kind of movement of discontent 25 26 with the federal government with things that had been 27 transpiring. The cost of living is rising. Social division. 28

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Just a lot of the rhetoric officials and stuff were using on 1 television. A lot of people were very unhappy over the past 2 couple of years and it -- basically it -- I would describe it as 3 4 -- if I could use a metaphor, the pot had just simply boiled over and many people have decided that this was going to be the 5 time that they were going to show up and exercise their right to 6 peacefully demonstrate their discontent and their displeasure 7 8 with the performance of the federal government.

9 MR. JOHN MATHER: And when you arrived in Ottawa,
10 you met people there who were members of the Diagolon community?

11

MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir.

12 MR. JOHN MATHER: And presumably, if you met 13 someone who hadn't heard of you or hadn't heard of Diagolon, you 14 would tell them about it and you'd tell them about your podcasts 15 and encourage them to listen and support?

MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes. If someone was 16 unfamiliar or they asked a question, I would just simply say I'm 17 18 a social media guy, I have a podcast. It's political 19 commentary, comedy and some, you know, analysis and this kind of 20 thing. If you're interested, I have business cards that somebody made up for me. I would hand them out to me and say, 21 "This is the web site if you'd like to check it out" and so on 22 and, you know, have a nice day, kind of thing. 23

24 MR. JOHN MATHER: And those business cards, they25 would have had the Diagolon logo on them?

26 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, on one side.
 27 MR. JOHN MATHER: Did those -- sorry. You might
 28 have cut out.

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I asked you, did the business cards have the
 Diagolon logo on them?

3 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, they did. They have 4 it on one side and then one of my other artistic logos on the 5 other side with just simply the -- the web site on one side and 6 then I think it says "Find me and tell your friends" on the 7 other.

8 MR. JOHN MATHER: And you suggested this is 9 something you'd do if someone came up to you, but I -- is it 10 fair to say, Mr. MacKenzie, you're in the media business and you 11 want to promote your media so you would also actively hand out 12 those cards?

MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: Yes, sir. If someone asks or they're interested or they express the desire to learn like what it is I'm doing, it's just easier to just give them this. It directs them to the web site. All my social media links and so on are there. There's a short video. They can go from there. If they like what they see, I presume they'll continue. If not, then so be it.

20 MR. JOHN MATHER: Did you attend at any point in 21 the protest with a person named Alex Vriend? Apologies if I'm 22 mispronouncing the name.

23

MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir.

24 MR. JOHN MATHER: And who is Alex Vriend?
 25 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: He's someone I met online
 26 through -- through the evolution of my podcast, I suppose.
 27 I met Alex in person in the summer of 2021, I

28 believe. We spent time together in Saskatchewan as he was

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travelling around the country, meeting people.
 And as I understood it, he was just kind of in

between, you know, jobs in life and wasn't really sure what --3 4 he was just taking the opportunity to -- he bought a van and a dog and just kind of went on the classic Canadian road trip 5 around the country and was meeting up with other people in the 6 7 community that expressed a desire to, you know, meet them and, you know, hang out and he'd become kind of one of the prominent 8 -- prominent person because of his -- he also is a content 9 creator. He makes a lot of memes and jokes and comedic things 10 11 like this and so people were interested to meet him and ---

MR. JOHN MATHER: And his content he posts underthe name "Ferryman Stole". Is that correct?

14

MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir.

15 MR. JOHN MATHER: And we understand both from 16 your letter to the Senate and some videos that your counsel 17 submitted that when you were in Ottawa, you encouraged peaceful 18 protesting. Is that fair?

19

MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir.

20 I was concerned, especially because of the rhetoric and verbiage coming out of, again, the Canadian Anti-21 Hate Network, which was being parroted -- started to be picked 22 up by other, more credible news outlets and so on that I was 23 concerned that if something should happen outside my control or 24 -- you know, I can't really see the future but I wanted to state 25 26 very clearly what my intentions were and what I expected of 27 people if they were going to be representing myself or brandishing any of my -- I encouraged them not to because I 28

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1 wanted this to be about Canada and that this about the country, "Bring a Canadian flag. This isn't about me. This isn't about 2 -- I'm not trying to sell anything. This is more important. 3 4 The bigger idea is more important. But if you do, you know, happen to have something, please conduct yourself appropriately 5 because your action and decisions and things you say and you do 6 7 will reflect upon me in the greater community," and so on. So -8 _ _ 9 MR. JOHN MATHER: So just to ---MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: --- I wanted to have that 10 11 on the record before, just in case. 12 MR. JOHN MATHER: So just to stop there, so you wanted someone who was wearing a Diagolon symbol to act 13 14 accordingly -- I guess not "accordingly" but act as appropriately and peacefully. At this point in time, were you 15 aware that there -- either the RCMP or other police agencies 16 would be maybe monitoring what you do or what your supporters 17 18 do? 19 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir. 20 MR. JOHN MATHER: So you -- when you're giving that direction, you're aware that the authorities are watching? 21 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I was under -- I was never 22 explicitly given any notice, or no one had talked to me or 23

25 explicitly given any notice, of no one had tarked to me of 24 spoken to anybody. It was pretty clear just on general 25 observations, my own instincts, that this was -- we were 26 probably on the radar somewhere, so I didn't want anything to be 27 misconstrued. I was trying to be very clear about my intentions 28 and, you know -- you know, "Jokes aside, this is about, you

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know, protesting the government's performance and people
 exercising their rights to do so." I didn't want this to be
 misconstrued in any way. We were simply there to protest
 peacefully.

I said things like, "If there's a speed limit on 5 walking for some reason, then you will walk slower than that. 6 7 Don't even litter. Don't spit. Don't even throw a snowball. Don't give anyone any excuse to point at you say, 'Look what 8 you've done. Look what you've incited, '" or created or 9 fomented, and so on because that would have undermined the 10 entire purpose of the -- of everything everyone was trying to 11 achieve. 12

MR. JOHN MATHER: So, Mr. MacKenzie, I'm now going to read you, one by one, a list of names. And I may have some follow-up questions but all I want to know right now is, for each name, whether or not you communicated with this individual while you were -- either before you arrived in Ottawa or while you were in Ottawa; okay?

19 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: All right. 20 MR. JOHN MATHER: You understand? MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes. 21 22 MR. JOHN MATHER: Tamara Lich. MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No, I first spoke to 23 Tamara, potentially, in July of this year, July/August, and that 24 25 was it. 26 MR. JOHN MATHER: Okay. Chris Barber.

27 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No.

28 MR. JOHN MATHER: James Bauder.

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1 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No. 2 MR. JOHN MATHER: Brigitte Belton. 3 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No. 4 MR. JOHN MATHER: Benjamin Dichter. MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I'm aware of who Mr. 5 Dichter is. I personally have not had any interaction with him. 6 I was aware that he was a -- some kind of alleged manager of 7 YouTube channels for where he would set up GoFundMes and name 8 9 himself as a beneficiary ---MR. JOHN MATHER: Mr. MacKenzie, I don't mean to 10 11 interrupt and -- it's just I want to make sure we get through it and you have time. 12 13 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Right. 14 MR. JOHN MATHER: And I just want to know right now whether you communicated with these people. Your counsel 15 will have an opportunity if there's other things that you want 16 17 to bring up. 18 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes. MR. JOHN MATHER: Did you ever communicate, 19 20 either before or while you were in Ottawa, with a Tom Marazzo? 21 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, I spoke to Mr. Marazzo once, possibly twice, over the phone, once as I was 22 driving back from Ottawa to the Maritimes to drop off some 23 people that had accompanied me. They could only stay for a 24 couple of days and had families and kids and so on. So I spoke 25 26 to him for a couple of hours. We talked about, you know, our 27 shared experiences in the military and so on. He indicated to me that he was, in some capacity, nearby something resembling 28

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people that were making decisions, I guess, and basically just 1 kind of connected in that, like, someone suggested we should 2 meet each other and I expressed to him that if there was 3 anything that I could do to help assist, get a message out or 4 something, that I was willing to do that. No one ever asked me 5 And likewise, I told him, if I saw or was made aware of 6 to. anything that I felt that would be relevant that they should 7 know about, that I would inform him, and so on. But I think 8 that was the extent of our interaction. 9

I didn't have any real meaningful interaction with Mr. Marazzo I think until around April when he was at a benefit -- at a fundraising dinner for the Veterans for Freedom Organization in Burlington.

14 MR. JOHN MATHER: In Ottawa, how many times did15 you speak with Mr. Marazzo?

16 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: At least once, possibly17 twice.

18 MR. JOHN MATHER: And when was the first time you19 spoke with Mr. Marazzo?

20 MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: It would have been some 21 time during the first week, I believe, of when the trucks 22 arrived. I was in the process -- I don't know, I was driving my 23 truck and it was over the headset. The other guys were sleeping 24 in the truck while we were talking so somewhere in between and 25 Quebec and New Brunswick; I couldn't say.

26 MR. JOHN MATHER: So sometime before January 28th?
 27 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I'm not sure. I'm not
 28 sure of the dates of when the trucks arrived and when they left.

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1 MR. JOHN MATHER: But -- sorry, and there's evidence of trucks arrived but it was some point before the 2 trucks arrived; is that correct? 3 4 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No, it was after. MR. JOHN MATHER: It was after. How long after? 5 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I would say, roughly, a 6 7 week ---8 MR. JOHN MATHER: Roughly, a week. 9 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: --- so seven, to five, to eight days, perhaps. 10 MR. JOHN MATHER: Fair enough. When you were in 11 Ottawa, did you communicate directly with any Ottawa Police or 12 13 OPP? MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Not to my knowledge. 14 Ι did have some friendly conversations on the street, you know, 15 just, "Hi, how are you? How's it going? It's cold out," you 16 know, that kind of thing, but nothing significant, no. 17 18 MR. JOHN MATHER: Did you receive from any --19 sorry, I think there was a -- did you receive, from any sources, 20 information about police operations or police enforcement plans while you were in Ottawa? 21 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, there was a user that 22 contacted me, I believe, on Telegram, I would say again, summer 23 of 2021 who self-identified himself as an RCMP member, just kind 24 25 of friendly -- expressed that he enjoyed the podcast and liked 26 what I was saying and so on, so there was a loose relationship with this -- whoever this person was. 27 And during that time in Ottawa, they had reached 28

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1 out to me to inform me of -- to say that the POU, which I had find, you know, if that was -- I didn't understand the 2 nomenclature of a police officer but I understood it to be the 3 4 Public Order Unit -- essentially the Riot Police were being activated to be sent to Ottawa. And further to that, after the 5 Emergency Act had been invoked, this person had sent me -- well, 6 they were screenshots, I guess, of either a WhatsApp group chat 7 8 or a Telegram -- I'm not sure -- of various RCMP officers 9 engaging in taking selfies of, you know, drinking and eating and so and celebrating the violence that they were bringing upon the 10 11 people downtown and saying, "Wait until they hear our jackboots," and this kind of thing. 12

He sent that to me and I said, "Well, is this real?" And he assured me, "Yes." It seemed -- it looked very real and I said, "I will publish this." And he said, "That's why we sent it to you." So I did and I released that on Telegram and that -- you know, it went out. Since then, that person has deleted their account sometime in March and I haven't been in contact with them since.

20 MR. JOHN MATHER: Okay. Do you remember their21 name on Telegram?

22 MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: The user handle was, like, 23 "GK", or "PK", or something. It was two initials and a phone 24 number. I think it was an Ontario area code but, other than 25 that, I didn't ---

26 MR. JOHN MATHER: Other than that user, did 27 anyone else provide information about police operations or 28 enforcement plans?

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1	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No.
2	MR. JOHN MATHER: If we could pull up
3	OPP00001668. And then if sorry, if we could go to page 5,
4	please. Yeah, scroll down more. So is an OPP Intelligence
5	brief, Mr. MacKenzie. You may have seen it with respect to some
6	of disclosure we provided, but I assume you have you you
7	wouldn't have seen the document before today. I'm going to ask
8	you, if you look at Item 2, it says actually, for context,
9	look at Item 1. It talks about a video posted to the name is
10	redacted but it says the name of Instagram account and it says
11	"Raging Dissident". So that would be you, Mr. MacKenzie
12	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir.
13	MR. JOHN MATHER: as far as you know?
14	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir.
15	MR. JOHN MATHER: And then Item 2, again, talks
16	about a video posted to the "Raging Dissident" account in which
17	the poster shares information credited to police sources that
18	disclose enforcement plans, and then it provides a bit of a
19	description. Is that the information that the user on Telegram
20	provided you?
21	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir.
22	MR. JOHN MATHER: Okay. On this same on the
23	same page, if you look at Item 3, it talks about on February 8^{th}
24	a user posted two videos to his Telegram channel, "Rage Board".
25	Is that your Telegram channel?
26	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: That was one of the
27	previous names of it, yes.
28	MR. JOHN MATHER: Okay. And if you look there,

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1 if you -- there's a line break and then it says again: 2 "[Name redacted] says there's supposed 3 to be some negotiations taking place 4 with a government delegate, but he hasn't heard how it went from 5 organizers yet; he goes on state." 6 7 Do you see that? 8 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No, sir. 9 MR. JOHN MATHER: Sorry. Let me -- I'm talking a little quickly. I'll slow down. 10 11 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Oh, yes. Yes. Thanks. MR. JOHN MATHER: Yeah, you ---12 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Sorry, I've caught up. 13 14 MR. JOHN MATHER: And take your time. I want to make sure that you're reading this before I ask you questions. 15 So this suggests that you were aware that there 16 might be negotiations with a government delegate, but you hadn't 17 heard from the organisers yet. Do you know what that's a 18 19 reference to? MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I can't recall. 20 Т remember being under the impression that there was some of form 21 22 of negotiations taking place between some sort of leadership apparatus for the convoy and the perhaps City of Ottawa, RCMP, 23 OPP, I'm not sure. The police and the convoy people. 24 MR. JOHN MATHER: Fair enough. How did you learn 25 26 that information? 27 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: That's a good question. I

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think it may have just been kind of common knowledge that there

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1 was -- something like that was taking place. More of a rumour, perhaps. The -- as it goes on, yeah, the Public Order Unit, I 2 was -- that was a -- given to me specifically by this user on 3 4 Telegram from the RCMP, that they -- allegedly they were. MR. JOHN MATHER: Right. And you're talking, 5 then, about the part that's in bold after that, is that correct? 6 7 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes. Yes. 8 MR. JOHN MATHER: Are you aware that Tom Marazzo 9 met with City Manager Steve Kanellakos on February 8th, 2022? 10 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No, sir. MR. JOHN MATHER: Did Mr. Marazzo ever talk to 11 you about meeting with Mr. Kanellakos or meeting with any 12 government officials in any of the conversations you had? 13 14 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No, he did not. MR. JOHN MATHER: Okay. Have you ever spoken 15 with Keith Wilson or Eva Chipuik? 16 17 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No, sir. 18 MR. JOHN MATHER: We can take that down. Thank 19 you, Mr. Clerk. 20 Mr. MacKenzie, I think you'd agree with me it's fair to say that you were critical of the Federal Government's 21 response to the protests in Ottawa and Coutts; is that correct? 22 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir. Initially, it 23 was -- I had no issue. Actually, I thought it was handled very 24 appropriately. There was a strong police presence, but also 25 26 there was a large number of people, so apparently there was a danger that there's going to be -- you know, something could 27 happen so it made sense. I didn't take any issue with anything 28

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1 that I had seen until they started becoming a little more aggressive here and there. There was an incident where some 2 fuel cans were stolen, or seized, or what have you, but it 3 4 wasn't really until the EMA was invoked that they became extremely aggressive and violent and that is -- that was what I 5 took the most issue with. 6 7 MR. JOHN MATHER: Did you ever say that the RCMP 8 was intentionally cutting truckers off from essential supplies in Ottawa and Coutts? 9 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: That is what I had been 10 11 hearing from people, yes. 12 MR. JOHN MATHER: And so -- and did you then repeat that on your podcast? 13 14 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I may have, yes. MR. JOHN MATHER: Did you ever say that the RCMP 15 made -- attempted to disrupt cell phone towers to ensure 16 truckers could not communicate? 17 18 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: That again was another 19 scenario. There were people having a lot of issues with their 20 cell phones. That may or may not have been the conduct of some kind of interference, it could have been just too many cell 21 phones and not enough towers, I'm not sure, but that again is 22 another kind of running suspicion/theory at the time. 23 MR. JOHN MATHER: Fair enough. And my question 24 25 right now is if you recall if that's something you said on your 26 podcast that that was something that had been -- was being said? 27 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I may have, yes. 28 MR. JOHN MATHER: And did you ever say on your

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1 podcast that -- or -- sorry, let me back up. Did you ever distribute or know of anyone distributing contact information 2 about the members of the Ottawa Police Service? 3 4 MR. JEREMY MaCKENZIE: Not to my knowledge, no. 5 MR. JOHN MATHER: If we can pull up SSM.NSC.CAN.00001575_REL.0001. 6 7 Apologies for all those digits, Mr. MacKenzie. 8 So scroll up to the top, please, just so I can 9 give the witness some context. So Mr. MacKenzie, this is a CSIS Analytical 10 11 Brief, dated February 21st, 2022. And if we could go to page 3 of the brief, 12 please. And scroll down a bit further, please. Scroll down a 13 14 little bit further, please. So this part of the brief says that: 15 "Since the initial weekend...key 16 figures within Diagolon have made 17 18 ...appeals for participation in and 19 documentation of the demonstrations. 20 Further, Vriend has been collecting donations to allow others to travel to 21 22 participate in demonstration in Coutts, AB, or Ottawa, ON." 23 24 Do you see that? 25 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir. 26 MR. JOHN MATHER: Do you have any knowledge about 27 whether or not Mr. Vriend was collecting donations to allow people to participate in both Coutts and Ottawa? 28

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1 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I recall he was collecting some funds for someone. I don't think it was just in general 2 open to whoever wanted them. I think there was one or two 3 4 people potentially from western Canada expressed a desire to come down to Ottawa, they couldn't afford it, so I think that 5 was roughly what was going on. And I wasn't directly involved, 6 7 I can't recall entirely, but I think that's what was going on. MR. JOHN MATHER: And then if we could scroll up 8 9 in this document to the, sorry, the next page up. Sorry. Sorry, keep scrolling up. Stop there. 10 11 So this, again, this is a CSIS document, but it has a box here that says, In Jeremy MacKenzie's Own Words. It's 12 -- the first one says: 13 14 "'This is the good guys versus the bad quys.... The showdown has finally 15 fucking begun and it has begun in 16 Canada... you could go be a part of the 17 18 story now. ' " 19 Is that something you've said? 20 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: It sounds like something I said, yes. 21 22 MR. JOHN MATHER: And is that something you have said with respect to the protests in either Ottawa or Coutts? 23 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Probably, I believe so, 24 25 yes. 26 MR. JOHN MATHER: And then the next quote is: 27 "'This is the beach, get yourself out 28 there.'"

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1 Is that something you said with respect to the protests in either Ottawa or Coutts? 2 3 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Probably, yes. 4 MR. JOHN MATHER: Okay. And in this case, when you're using the "beach", are you referring to the analogy we 5 spoke about with D-Day? 6 7 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I was referring to the 8 idea that this -- again, a lot of people had felt very powerless 9 and disenfranchised, upset, depressed, and this was an opportunity for them to actually go and participate and have 10 11 their voices be heard and join these demonstrations, and rather than sitting at home complaining and whining about it on the 12 13 couch, they could, you know, if you can, why not? Why not go and be involved? 14 MR. JOHN MATHER: And I've heard you say that, 15 Mr. MacKenzie. I'm asking you if in this case when you're using 16

the word "beach" if you're -- it's using it in the same context when you're alluding to D-Day? And the reason I'm asking this is you know that the police and the government view you -- view your group as potentially -- as extremist, and so this is the sort of thing that would grab their interest. So when you're talking about "beach" you're talking about D-Day; is that right?

23 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I was trying to speak 24 directly to my audience that are familiar with my verbiage, my 25 kind of terminology and things I reference in the way that they 26 would understand, that this is something important that, you 27 know, we should -- you know, you can do together. It's not -- I 28 didn't -- certainly didn't mean it any kind of violent context

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1 or D-Day invasion type scenario. I certainly meant it as an encouraging kind of call to the community at large that, "Hey, 2 you know, if this is something, you know, you could be involved 3 4 in rather than just, again, sitting at home by yourself." MR. JOHN MATHER: So Mr. Clerk, you can take that 5 document down. 6 Thank you. 7 I now have some questions for you, Mr. MacKenzie, 8 about the protests in Coutts. 9 Just first, simple yes or no, did you ever travel 10 to Coutts personally? 11 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No. MR. JOHN MATHER: Did you know anyone who was 12 protesting in Coutts in February 2022? 13 14 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I was aware that Mr. Chris Lysak was there, and I am loosely acquainted with Mr. Adam 15 Skelly who had made a couple of trips there to deliver steaks 16 and brisket and so on. There is a couple of comedians in the 17 18 Edmonton and Calgary area that I know that travelled down to put 19 on some, I don't know, a performance I think, and they just 20 meet, greet, and leave, and that's about it. MR. JOHN MATHER: What were the names of the two 21 comedians? 22 23 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: It was Brendan Blackyer (ph) and a Sam Walker, or -- maybe -- I'm not sure if Sam 24 attended, but Brendan for sure, and there was also Brett 25 26 Fortier, who I don't know, personally I have not spoken to him. I was just made aware that they were there because they posted a 27 video of them travelling there to say hi to everybody. 28

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1 MR. JOHN MATHER: And so Chris Lysak, Mr. -- Adam Skelly, Brendan and Sam, are they members of the Diagolon 2 community? 3 4 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No. They may identify as fans. Mr. Lysak would, Brendan probably would, Sam, 5 potentially, Mr. Fortier I've never met or spoken to. 6 7 MR. JOHN MATHER: If you're a fan of Diagolon, 8 you're part of the community; right? 9 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Again, it's just kind of self-identifying. You could say it's as simple as, you know, 10 11 identifying as a Toronto Maple Leaf's fan by putting a sticker on your truck. It's really that simple. 12 13 MR. JOHN MATHER: So the answer to my question is yes? 14 15 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I suppose so, yes. MR. JOHN MATHER: Were you communicating with the 16 individuals you just identified while they were in Coutts? 17 18 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No. 19 MR. JOHN MATHER: How do you know Chris Lysak? 20 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Mr. Lysak has been a longtime fan of the podcast. I'd met him personally in Saskatchewan 21 in the summer of 2021, believe on the 1st meet and greet get-22 together I'd mentioned, and a subsequent one later in the year, 23 perhaps September. There was a few dozen people. We, you know, 24 had a beer and a steak, you know, with all these people, took 25 26 photographs together at one of them, and that's pretty much it. 27 MR. JOHN MATHER: Did you talk to him when you 28 were at either of those two meet and greets?

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1 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, I talked to dozens of 2 people, yeah. 3 MR. JOHN MATHER: Yeah. 4 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Chris was one of them. MR. JOHN MATHER: And I take it the topic of 5 conversation at these meet and greets include the similar topics 6 7 that you discuss on your podcast; is that fair? 8 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I generally don't like to 9 engage in that. I find it kind of exhausting and I try to just make it -- keep it kind of a social, you know, meet and greet, 10 11 you know, casual kind of social event. I don't really try to talk politics or anything like that ---12 13 MR. JOHN MATHER: But presumably ---14 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: --- to people. MR. JOHN MATHER: --- but presumably, your fans 15 when they meet you in person, they want to talk to you about 16 what they hear you talking about, your podcast. That's fair; 17 isn't it? 18 19 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Sometimes, yes. 20 MR. JOHN MATHER: Can we pull up COM00000907? So, Mr. MacKenzie, can you please identify the 21 people in this photo? 22 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yeah, that's the fellow I 23 24 just mentioned. I had posted it to my Instagram page. That's myself on the -- my left and Mr. Lysak on the right. 25 MR. JOHN MATHER: And this -- was this at the 26 27 first event in Saskatchewan? 28 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I believe so, yes.

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MR. JOHN MATHER: Okay. And just to be clear, 1 Mr. MacKenzie, other than that event in Saskatchewan and then 2 the other event in September 2021, is there any other times you 3 4 met with Mr. Lysak? 5 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No. MR. JOHN MATHER: Did you communicate with him at 6 7 any time other than at those events? 8 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Mr. Lysak may have been in 9 some larger online group chats where there's 30, 40 other people involved, never -- to my knowledge, never directly one-on-one. 10 11 He has called me twice, I think, since he's been incarcerated, just simply to say hi and I just try to offer some encouragement 12 to him and hope that he's doing well sort of. 13 14 MR. JOHN MATHER: So you spoke to him after his arrest in Coutts? 15 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sometime this summer. 16 17 MR. JOHN MATHER: Okay. And I asked you 18 generally about the people you identified who you knew in 19 Coutts, but with respect to Mr. Lysak specifically, did you 20 understand him to be a fan of your podcasts? MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir. 21 22 MR. JOHN MATHER: And you understood him to be a member of the Diagolon community? 23 24 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes. 25 MR. JOHN MATHER: Are you aware that Mr. Lysak, 26 or at least there's been reports that Mr. Lysak had a Diagolon 27 flag flying outside the house in which he lived with his father? MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I have heard that, yes. 28

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1 MR. JOHN MATHER: Yeah, so if we could pull up 2 COM917? 3 And so have you ever read this article that's on 4 the screen, Mr. MacKenzie? MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I may have. It's tough to 5 recall. 6 7 MR. JOHN MATHER: It's an article in the Toronto 8 Star and you're quoted in it. Do you remember giving a quote to 9 the Toronto Star with respect to an article they were writing 10 about Mr. Lysak? 11 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I think so. I've spoken with Toronto Star several times, yes. 12 13 MR. JOHN MATHER: Okay. And if you could go down to page 3 just so I can show you just -- you'll see in the 14 middle of the page it says, 15 "When reached by the Star this week, 16 MacKenzie said in an email that he'd 17 18 met Chris [...] along with "thousands 19 of people by now through my podcast and 20 travels around the country." " Which is as you explained. So we can take that 21 down. 22 Mr. MacKenzie, are you aware that on February $14^{\rm th}$ 23 the RCMP executed a search warrant in Coutts, Alberta and 24 25 arrested 13 people, and as a part of that arrest, they seized several weapons and body armour? Is that something you're aware 26 27 of? MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir. 28

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1 MR. JOHN MATHER: And how did you become aware of 2 that? 3 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I was made aware of it by 4 once it hit the media either that evening or the following day. MR. JOHN MATHER: And when did you become aware 5 that Mr. Lysak was one of the people who was arrested? 6 7 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: It was right around the 8 same time that word had spread around the community that he had been arrested was -- as part of the 13 or however many other 9 10 people were arrested. 11 MR. JOHN MATHER: And are you aware that Mr. Lysak was charged with conspiracy to murder, uttering threats 12 and possession of a weapon? 13 14 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir. MR. JOHN MATHER: After the arrest, as the 15 Commission understands it, you posted a video in Ottawa where 16 you talked about the people who'd gotten arrested in Coutts. Do 17 18 you know what I'm talking about? 19 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir, I do, sir. 20 MR. JOHN MATHER: What I'll do is I'll it up. I'm not going to play it for you because of our time, but if you 21 22 can identify it as a video that you participated in, that would 23 be helpful. 24 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yeah. 25 MR. JOHN MATHER: COM00000911. Actually, you 26 might just play the first maybe 30 seconds. 27 (VIDEO PLAYBACK) MR. JOHN MATHER: Okay. You can stop it there. 28

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MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: M'hm.

2 MR. JOHN MATHER: So is that a video you posted,
3 Mr. MacKenzie?

4 **MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE:** Yes, that appears to be a clip from one of my podcast episodes probably shortly after that 5 had taken place. At the time, and still presently, I'm very 6 7 skeptical of law enforcement, especially considering the political nature in which there appears to be a lot of 8 9 interference going on in the country. I was concerned that -from that aspect of what was happening out there. Again, I 10 11 don't know anything other than what's been posted in the media and what's been said other than that they've been charged with -12 - what they've been charged with. Of course, if it -- evidence 13 14 does appear or is presented that proves that these allegations are, in fact, correct, obviously, that is something I would 15 denounce. I don't stand by that. As I said, this is not 16 something that is supported by myself. It would undermine the 17 18 entire purpose of these protests. And until then, I hope they 19 get a fair trial, and we'll see what happens.

20 MR. JOHN MATHER: And you're correct, Mr.
21 MacKenzie, the matter is before the courts, and so it is yet to
22 be adjudicated in the appropriate setting.

23

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MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Fair enough.

MR. JOHN MATHER: The media reports are that the people who were arrested, there was concern by the police that some of them were intending to use the weapons to harm police officers or murder police officers. Again, that is going to be dealt with another matter, but I assume if that was someone's

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1 intent, you would denounce it ---2 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yeah. 3 MR. JOHN MATHER: --- at -- is that what -- did I 4 hear that correctly? 5 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Absolutely, yes. MR. JOHN MATHER: In the video -- you can take it 6 down, thank you, Mr. Clerk -- you mention the boys in Alberta 7 8 when you're talking about the arrest. Other than Mr. Lysak, do 9 you know anyone else who got arrested in Alberta? 10 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No, sir. 11 MR. JOHN MATHER: I'm just -- just to be clear, I'm going to read you the names and I just want you to say yes 12 or no, yes, I know them, no, I don't know them. 13 14 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Sure. MR. JOHN MATHER: Ursula Gwen Allred? 15 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No. 16 17 **MR. JOHN MATHER:** Luke Berk? 18 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No. 19 MR. JOHN MATHER: Christopher Dean Carbert or 20 Carbert? MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: 21 No. MR. JOHN MATHER: Evan Banning Colenutt? 22 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No. 23 MR. JOHN MATHER: Johnson Chichow Law? 24 25 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No. 26 MR. JOHN MATHER: Jaclyn Francis Martin? 27 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Ms. Martin I did have a conversation with maybe in June or July, and she was in one of 28

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1	these video chats and introduced herself and mentioned that she
2	was well, maybe that wasn't her. Martin?
3	MR. JOHN MATHER: And, Mr. MacKenzie, just to
4	stop you there. I'm interested in people you knew as of
5	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: At the time?
6	MR. JOHN MATHER: as of February
7	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes.
8	MR. JOHN MATHER: 14 th , 2022.
9	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Right. Yeah, no.
10	MR. JOHN MATHER: Justin Lyle Martin?
11	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No.
12	MR. JOHN MATHER: Jerry Mitchell Troy Morin?
13	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No.
14	MR. JOHN MATHER: Easton Stewart Oler?
15	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No.
16	MR. JOHN MATHER: Anthony George Olienick?
17	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No.
18	MR. JOHN MATHER: Joanne Lyne Person?
19	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No.
20	MR. JOHN MATHER: Janx Anthon Zaremba?
21	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No.
22	MR. JOHN MATHER: Mr. Commissioner, I'm almost
23	done, if I could have a few more minutes, please.
24	COMMISSIONER ROULEAU: Okay.
25	MR. JOHN MATHER: Mr. MacKenzie, I'm sure you are
26	no doubt aware that the RCMP released photos of the weapons and
27	body armour they seized, and why don't we pull up two photos
28	first with COM915. And if we could just scroll out.

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1 And this is just to give you some context, Mr. MacKenzie. This is the larger photo the weapons and the 2 ammunition and the vests that were seized. 3 4 And then if we could pull up COM916. And what I'm going to show you is a photo that's zooming in on the vest 5 that if you're looking at the photos to the right. 6 7 I expect you know what I'm going to show you at 8 this point, Mr. MacKenzie. 9 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, I do. MR. JOHN MATHER: So this was -- this is a zoom-10 11 in of the photo we're looking at, and that's one of the pieces of -- that's a ballistic vest, as I understand it. Is that 12 13 correct? 14 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: It appears to be some kind of tactical vest. If it was ballistic, it would have to have 15 some kind of ballistic plates or Kevlar or something inserted 16 into it. It's not clear. 17 18 MR. JOHN MATHER: Right. Fair enough. 19 You see on there, there's two patches with the 20 Diagolon symbol; correct? MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes. It does appear that 21 that is the case. However, I was made aware of this shortly 22 after this took place. And after some scrutiny and taking a 23 closer look at the photos, they don't appear to be -- as I said, 24 there was man in Prince Edward Island who was making these and 25 26 selling them at cost to whoever. Thousands of these went out across Canada, some to the United States, some to Australia. 27 28 These ones are -- appear to be homemade or made

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1 by someone else. As of now, I don't recall anyone coming forward to say that they had produced these or where these came 2 from, so I can't really speak to as their origins. 3 4 MR. JOHN MATHER: Right. But you agreed with me earlier, Mr. MacKenzie, that any one of your fans or anyone who 5 is in the Diagolon community who supported you could have easily 6 7 made a patch that looks just like that. Isn't that right? 8 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes. 9 MR. JOHN MATHER: If we could pull up -- and this 10 will be the last document, Mr. Commissioner, 11 PB.NSC.CAN.0008508 REL.0001. So Mr. MacKenzie, again this is a document --12 this one's from the RCMP "K" Division, and it's a form of report 13 about the arrests that we've been talking about in Coutts, 14 15 Alberta. And if we can scroll down to where it says 16 "Current situation", it says in the second bullet point: 17 18 "A ballistic vest was seized during the 19 search warrant at the residence in 20 Coutts which contained a patch reflective of the DIAGOLON flag. It is 21 believed that this vest belongs to one 22 of the accused, Christopher LYSAK. Open 23 source information has linked LYSAK to 24 [redacted name]." 25 26 So Mr. MacKenzie, this isn't your report, I know 27 you didn't produce it, but you would agree with me that from the RCMP's perspective, they believed that the vest with the 28

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1 Diagolon symbol was Mr. Lysak's; correct? 2 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: That does appear to be 3 what they believe, yes. 4 COMMISSIONER ROULEAU: Sorry. Your counsel had an objection. 5 MR. SHERIF FODA: It's unfair to this witness to 6 7 ask him to speculate what is in the RCMP's mind and their 8 perspective about intelligence. 9 COMMISSIONER ROULEAU: I think maybe the question wasn't that well framed, but the quote speaks for itself. He 10 11 could ask whether he agrees with the quote, is on the RCMP letterhead. I mean, it's really not much further than that, I 12 13 take it. 14 MR. JOHN MATHER: No, I actually withdraw the question, Mr. Commissioner. I agree that he has no -- he 15 doesn't know why the RCMP made their observations, so I agree 16 with that and I withdraw it. And those are my questions. 17 18 Thank you. 19 COMMISSIONER ROULEAU: Okay. So now we'll go 20 with first the Convoy Organizers. MR. BRENDAN MILLER: The Convoy Organizers are 21 ceding their time to Mr. MacKenzie's counsel, sir. 22 23 COMMISSIONER ROULEAU: Okay. Government of Canada? 24 25 --- CROSS-EXAMINATION BY MR. STEPHEN AYLWARD 26 MR. STEPHEN AYLWARD: Good afternoon, Mr. 27 MacKenzie. My name is Stephen Aylward. I'm one of the lawyers for the Government of Canada. 28

MacKENZIE Cr-Ex(Aylward)

1 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Hello. 2 MR. STEPHEN AYLWARD: Mr. MacKenzie, you 3 described Diagolon as a grassroots community. Do I have that 4 right? MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No, I wouldn't say it's 5 It sprang from my imagination and I create the 6 grassroots. 7 content from which the -- the entertainment and so on attracts people to it and which they will then either self-identify as a 8 9 fan or not. MR. STEPHEN AYLWARD: And you've described 10 11 yourself as the *de facto* leader of Diagolon? MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No, that's not correct. 12 I've never described myself in that manner. That's a -- that's 13 14 been put forward into the media again by people at the Canadian Anti-Hate Network. 15 Again, this is a figment of my imagination in a 16 fictional world. 17 18 MR. STEPHEN AYLWARD: I see. 19 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I can't really lead if --20 a fictional world, exactly. 21 MR. STEPHEN AYLWARD: The letter to the Senate that Commission counsel brought up earlier, you had described 22 yourself as the *de facto* leader in quotes, so I take it, then, 23 you're saying that was being used ironically in that context. 24 25 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, I was trying to 26 identify myself as the person in question that the Senate was 27 debating about and then the House of Commons were talking about -- which alarmed me, and I was acting in the interests of 28

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1 protecting not only myself, but other people that identify as fans and followers of mine, and it was clear that this was an 2 3 issue of national importance. And I felt obliged to say 4 something about it rather than ignore it. MR. STEPHEN AYLWARD: Right. And you have no 5 formal authority over anyone who's part of the Diagolon 6 7 community. Is that right? 8 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: That's correct. There's 9 no hierarchy and there's no rank system, membership, code of conduct, uniforms, anything like this. It's a very informal --10 11 again, I would propose it as if you're a fan of the Calgary Flames or Montreal Canadiens or not or something. It's just as 12 simple as saying you like it or you don't. 13 14 MR. STEPHEN AYLWARD: Okay. And you view yourself as somewhat of a calming presence within the Diagolon 15 community? 16 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No, I would view myself as 17 18 the, I guess, central figure from which the rest of it sort of 19 orbits. 20 MR. STEPHEN AYLWARD: Earlier you agreed with Commission counsel that you had put out messages urging people 21 22 in Ottawa not to use violence or to act unlawfully. You agree with that. 23 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Correct. 24 I did use my platform to try my best to, again, put forward messages and, I 25 26 guess, responsible messaging. 27 MR. STEPHEN AYLWARD: And you were putting out 28 those messages because you were concerned that some members of

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1 the Diagolon community would use violence or would act 2 unlawfully. 3 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: My concern was that 4 something could happen outside of my control and I would rather have had -- say something on record of what I would expect 5 people to -- you know, to behave lawfully and peacefully so that 6 7 they -- if they follow me, listen to me, and they heard that and 8 then chosen to act on their own and do something -- something 9 outside the desires of, you know, myself, then that's not really something I can control. I can't control what other people want 10 11 to do. But I did want to make it clear that this was -- this was -- my intention was a peaceful demonstration. 12 13 MR. STEPHEN AYLWARD: And you explained that there were other members of the Diagolon community with you in 14 Ottawa at the time of the Freedom Convoy? 15 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: That's correct. 16 MR. STEPHEN AYLWARD: How many, would you say? 17 18 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: There was a property that 19 we were staying at outside the city limits that had been offered 20 up by someone who was a fan. He had a vacant building, no furniture but, you know, it's got a roof, it's got heat, so you 21 can stay there. 22 At times there were three or four or five of us. 23 24 Other times, as many as 20. MR. STEPHEN AYLWARD: And were there other people 25 that you saw in Ottawa with Diagolon symbols who weren't part of 26 27 that group? MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I didn't personally 28

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observe anyone. One individual I did see that had a kind of flag, but outside that, I didn't see any symbolism of flags or patches or so on. I did encounter a number of people that recognized me and wanted to have a picture and talk and shake hands and so on.

6 MR. STEPHEN AYLWARD: Could we please call up
7 SSM.NSC.CAN.00000079_REL_0001?

8 Mr. MacKenzie, are you aware of reports that 9 members of the Plaid Army put out a YouTube video in which they 10 expressed the hope that the Freedom Convoy in Ottawa would be 11 the Canadian version of the January 6th riot in Capitol Hill?

MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I believe I know the --12 13 the clip that you're referring to, which is, again, taken out of 14 context of a much larger presentation broadcast which I was not a party to. Obviously, I can't speak to that person's 15 intentions or what they meant by that, but I will reinforce 16 that, again, it was not my intention to see any kind of 17 violence, political violence or anything like that because it 18 19 again, undermines the intentions and objectives of the 20 protestors, which was to peacefully demonstrate their discontent. 21

22 MR. STEPHEN AYLWARD: Thank you. If we could 23 actually pull up the next document? It a video,

24 PB.CAN.00001820_REL.0001, and if we could start the video at the 25 55-second mark, please?

And just while we're calling that up, you're aware that that there was a deal that was struck between some of the protest organizers in Ottawa and the City of Ottawa?

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1 MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: I don't believe so, no. 2 THE REGISTRAR: Counsel, if you would just allow a brief indulgence. We're having a bit of difficulty locating 3 4 that. MR. STEPHEN AYLWARD: Maybe I'll move on to the 5 next topic and then I'll come back to that. 6 7 In terms of the Coutts incident that Mr. Mather was just discussing with you, were you aware that there were a 8 number of individuals who travelled from Ottawa who were at the 9 Freedom Convoy event in Ottawa who then travelled to Coutts? 10 11 MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: No, sir. MR. STEPHEN AYLWARD: And in particular, to 12 clarify, referring to individuals who were charged as part of 13 that RCMP operation. 14 15 MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: No, sir. MR. STEPHEN AYLWARD: When -- just a moment ago, 16 when you were describing the -- we were looking at a photo of a 17 18 -- some sort of body armour that had the Diagolon symbol on it, 19 and you were expressing some concerns about the authenticity of 20 the Diagolon symbol there. Just to be clear, were you suggesting that the 21 Diagolon symbol had been planted there by law enforcement? 22 MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: Again, at the time and 23 still, I am sceptical of the RCMP particularly, but law 24 enforcement Canada has a history of things like this taking 25 26 place. It's not outside the realm of possibility that something like that is very easily replicated. Could it be planted? I'm 27 not suggesting that it certainly has or has not, but I would 28

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1 leave that open to possibility, yes. 2 MR. STEPHEN AYLWARD: I take it there's still 3 some issue in pulling up that video? 4 THE REGISTRAR: Correct, Counsel. **COMMISSIONER ROULEAU:** Is it going to be a while? 5 Should this be put off til a little later? 6 7 This may take a little while, THE REGISTRAR: 8 Commissioner. 9 **COMMISSIONER ROULEAU:** Okay. So maybe, if you're agreeable, you can complete your examination, subject to this 10 11 video, and we can slot you in a little bit in maybe 10 minutes, whenever this is sorted out? 12 MR. STEPHEN AYLWARD: Yes, that's fine. 13 I did 14 have one other video clip that I wanted to play. Is it possible to pull up the -- a different video clip? 15 THE REGISTRAR: Oh, sure, Counsel. I can assist 16 if you have the doc ID? 17 18 MR. STEPHEN AYLWARD: Yes. Okay. It's 19 COM00000911, the video that was played earlier. And if we could 20 just start that around the 30-second mark? (VIDEO PLAYBACK) 21 22 MR. STEPHEN AYLWARD: And so earlier you mentioned that there were some videos in which you had urged 23 24 people in Ottawa not to use violence, not to act unlawfully. 25 Do you view your comments, "You want to dance? 26 Let's dance," or I believe it was, "Hold the fuck down," do you 27 view those comments as in line with your earlier messaging? MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: It was my intention to 28

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1	convey that the protestors and the demonstrators had no
2	intention of relinquishing their life to peacefully
3	demonstrating. It was clear at the time that the rumblings and
4	things I'd been hearing and seeing that it was the intention of
5	the federal government to use force to dispel these people.
6	So as I said in the video and I'd saying for a
7	long time, is, you know to force a tyrant to act like one, you
8	simply refuse to bend to their will, and they will reveal
9	themselves to be who they are. In this case, they deployed the
10	RCMP and various police forces and beat people with batons and
11	shot them with tear gas canisters and trampled an Indigenous
12	elderly woman with a horse. Another man was dragged lifelessly
13	through a crowd, and so on.
14	So that was the price that people were willing to
15	pay, endure, for the Canadian people, to show them the true face
16	of what it was they were standing against.
17	MR. STEPHEN AYLWARD: Okay, thank you.
18	So if I might ask for just two minutes later to
19	address that issue with the video?
20	COMMISSIONER ROULEAU: I think it's now
21	available.
22	MR. STEPHEN AYLWARD: Oh, it is?
23	THE REGISTRAR: So Counsel, I believe it's been
24	renumbered to POE.DOJ0000014. It's an eight-minute long video,
25	correct?
26	MR. STEPHEN AYLWARD: Yes, that's right. If we
27	could start it at 55-second mark, please?
28	(VIDEO PLAYBACK)

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1 MR. STEPHEN AYLWARD: That's good, yeah. 2 So does -- I mentioned a deal earlier between protest organizers and the City. Does that video -- does that 3 4 refresh your memory about that issue? MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: Yeah. Apologies. A bit. 5 I was unclear as to what you were referring to. It's something 6 7 -- I think there was some kind of negotiation was taking place 8 to move some trucks from one place to another. I don't --9 again, I wasn't intimately involved. I don't know exactly the details about that, but to some extent. I'm not sure exactly. 10 11 MR. STEPHEN AYLWARD: Safe to say you were urging your followers not to go along with that deal? 12 13 MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: I was expressing concern 14 because at that time, there was a number of names that had appeared that somehow had gotten into the leadership cadre or 15 something, as you describe. 16 Now, I was very sceptical of their intentions and 17 18 I had some scepticism and fear that this was -- things were 19 moving in a malicious direction. 20 MR. STEPHEN AYLWARD: Thank you. COMMISSIONER ROULEAU: Thank you. 21 22 Next, I think it's the Ottawa Coalition of Residents and Businesses. 23 24 (SHORT PAUSE) --- CROSS-EXAMINATION BY MR. PAUL CHAMP: 25 26 MR. PAUL CHAMP: Good afternoon Mr. MacKenzie, 27 I'm not sure if you can see me there. My name is Paul Champ; 28 ___

MacKENZIE Cr-Ex(Champ)

1	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Hello.
2	MR. PAUL CHAMP: I'm a lawyer for the Ottawa
3	Coalition of Residents and Businesses, the people from downtown
4	Ottawa.
5	Just have a couple of questions for you.
6	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Sure.
7	MR. PAUL CHAMP: You mentioned in your testimony
8	about getting the screen captures of texts, group texts from
9	RCMP officers. You got that from a current RCMP member, is that
10	right?
11	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: At the time it was
12	delivered to me, I understood that to be the case. I couldn't
13	speak to if this person is still employed or not.
14	MR. PAUL CHAMP: Okay. And do you occasionally
15	have interactions of people who are fans, or interested in what
16	you say, or supporters who are current members of law
17	enforcement?
18	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, that's correct.
19	MR. PAUL CHAMP: And while you were in Ottawa,
20	were you during the convoy protests, were you in
21	communication with some of these individuals who are current law
22	enforcement members and are supporters of yours?
23	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Not not directly, no.
24	MR. PAUL CHAMP: And have you ever been in
25	contact with, or anyone communicated to you who is a current
26	member of the Canadian Security Intelligence Service who's a
27	supporter of you, or a fan of you?
28	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No. I've actually made

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1 numerous overtures and offers to speak to the Canadian Security Intelligence Service to try and shed some light on, you know, 2 myself and this community that they seem so concerned about, and 3 4 as of -- today is the first day that I have ever been asked a single question by anyone in any official capacity about it. 5 MR. PAUL CHAMP: Right. And you mentioned that 6 7 you had three or four people, or sometimes as many as 20 people, staying with you in the same location in Ottawa, is that right? 8 9 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Correct, yes. 10 MR. PAUL CHAMP: And those were up to 20 people 11 who were supporters or fans of yours? 12 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, that's correct. 13 MR. PAUL CHAMP: And some of these people were 14 former members of the military or current members of the military; veterans like yourself? 15 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I do not think so. I'd 16 have to go through a list to refresh my memory, but no, no-one's 17 18 jumping out at me. I don't think so. I believe they're all 19 civilians. 20 MR. PAUL CHAMP: Okay. Did any of them -- did any of them bring any firearms with them? 21 MR. JEREMY MACKENZIE: No, sir. And I actually 22 went out of my way to make sure that was adamantly very clear 23 that that would not be something I would endorse. And it's not 24 a good idea, and again, it would be a very dangerous situation. 25 26 It's illegal, and it's undermining the objectives of the 27 protesters. MR. PAUL CHAMP: For sure. Yeah, you were 28

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1 concerned about that, right; that some people in the protest might undermine the purpose of the protest by becoming violent. 2 3 And you didn't want that to happen; correct? 4 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: That's correct. MR. PAUL CHAMP: And that's why you made that 5 message out to people to not be violent, is that right? 6 7 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir. 8 MR. PAUL CHAMP: Because you knew some of the 9 people who were there could be volatile and could be violent, is that right? 10 11 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I understand that, in great numbers of people, and tens of thousands of people, there 12 is always going to be outliers of folks who, you know, may be 13 unhinged, they may be mentally ill. There could be any number 14 of factors that may contribute to something, and I was just 15 doing my best to mitigate any potential -- any influence that I 16 have to try to, you know, push things in a positive direction, 17 rather than, you know, say nothing or worse, contribute to, you 18 19 know, something negative happening. 20 MR. PAUL CHAMP: And when you were in Ottawa did you have contact with Mr. Randy Hillier? 21 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I met with Mr. Hillier 22 once, maybe twice. He didn't have much of a voice; he was 23 feeling under the weather, but yeah, I met him once or twice. 24 25 MR. PAUL CHAMP: While you were in Ottawa? MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Correct. 26 27 MR. PAUL CHAMP: And when you got the information about the RCMP text, did you pass that on to anyone in the 28

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1 convoy leadership? 2 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No, sir. I looked at it, I sat with it for about 10 minutes, and I just decided to 3 4 publish it on my calendar page for everyone to look at, and from there it went to Counter Signal Keean Bexte; Rebel News took it, 5 various other -- various other independent journalists, and so 6 7 on, took note of it. 8 Notably the legacy media CBC and so on did not 9 comment or provide any coverage or insight of that, but I simply just put it out there and, you know, it went off on its own into 10 11 the wild. MR. PAUL CHAMP: And you met with Mr. Hillier. 12 Did you meet with any other elected political officials while 13 you were in Ottawa during the convoy protests? 14 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No, sir. 15 MR. PAUL CHAMP: Either federally or 16 provincially? 17 18 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Not to my knowledge, no. 19 MR. PAUL CHAMP: And you'd indicated in your 20 testimony that you met Ms. Tamara Lich this summer? 21 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I spoke to her on the phone. I did see Tamara Lich briefly, she walked by me 22 somewhere in a hotel lobby. But I hadn't had any formal 23 interaction, conversation or anything with her until I'd spoken 24 to her on the phone sometime in, I want to say August. 25 26 MR. PAUL CHAMP: And the two of you, you were 27 discussing -- what was the topic you were discussing; this upcoming Inquiry, or other issues? 28

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1	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No, she had actually
2	called to express concern and so on for my legal situation.
3	MR. PAUL CHAMP: For your legal situation?
4	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, outside of the of
5	this.
6	MR. PAUL CHAMP: Okay.
7	Thank you very much, Mr. MacKenzie.
8	COMMISSIONER ROULEAU: Okay, thank you.
9	Next, the Ottawa Police Service.
10	CROSS-EXAMINATION BY MS. JESSICA BARROW:
11	MS. JESSICA BARROW: Good afternoon, Mr.
12	MacKenzie. My name is Jessica Barrow, and I am counsel for the
13	Ottawa Police Service.
14	Can you see and hear me all right?
15	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, I can. Hello.
15 16	MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, I can. Hello. MS. JESSICA BARROW: Excellent.
16	MS. JESSICA BARROW: Excellent.
16 17	MS. JESSICA BARROW: Excellent. I'm going to start with something that you

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happen. That video, it's achieved a fair amount of traction and play. So I think maybe people associated me with that for that reason. However, I -- no, at no time did I have any contact with any organizers. I didn't ask for any money, take any money, give any money; I had no hand in the logistics planning, anything like that. I was simply there at my own volition to observe and, you know, just be there for the experience.

8 MS. JESSICA BARROW: So you really had no
9 knowledge as to the specific intentions of the organizers,
10 except for whatever, perhaps, you were seeing online; is that
11 fair?

MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: The -- as far as the 12 intentions were concerned, I was basically just collating the 13 14 information that I could find in social media and what people were saying. I was aware of who some of the people were for 15 that reason, and they were echoing the same, you know, similar 16 kind of sentiments; they were there to, you know, do the protest 17 18 and show their discontent, and exercise their rights to do so, 19 and so on. I didn't have any -- I hadn't seen anything 20 disagreeable with that. I didn't see any intentions of, you know, violence or so on. 21

22 MS. JESSICA BARROW: Right. But with respect to
 23 your comment, in terms of this not being an in-and-out event,
 24 ---

25

MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: M'hm.

26 MS. JESSICA BARROW: --- are you aware that the 27 organizers, or some of them testified earlier this week that 28 this event become -- became much more significant than they had

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1 really anticipated? 2 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No, I was not. I haven't been able to view much of it or hear much of what's, you know, 3 4 transpired earlier. It was apparent to me just simply because of the -- Canada's a very large country, and the effort required 5 just to simply go to Ottawa from Alberta and British Columbia, 6 in Halifax and so on, indicated to me -- and the numbers in 7 which people were going, indicated to me this was not going to 8 9 be a quick trip to the city, as it were. 10 MS. JESSICA BARROW: Are you aware that, 11 similarly, that some of the organizers testified that they had not anticipated staying as long as they ultimately did? 12 13 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No, I'm not. 14 MS. JESSICA BARROW: Okay. I'm going to move on to the issue of social media. 15 Obviously, we heard some testimony from you today 16 about your particular use of social media. Would you agree with 17 18 me that social media is a tool that some people use to influence 19 the actions of others? 20 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, of course. MS. JESSICA BARROW: In fact, it's actually a 21 career now, being a social media influencer? 22 23 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, some people make a 24 living that way. 25 MS. JESSICA BARROW: And it's a tool that's used 26 to encourage people to buy things or used for social advocacy? 27 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, I think it's empowered a lot of people to express their voice in the world 28

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1 and establish themselves as such if they want to act similarly 2 to the way that corporate broadcasting and larger companies and 3 stuff do to push whatever products, ideas and things that they 4 want to they can now compete with them in the same kind of space 5 I suppose.

6 MS. JESSICA BARROW: So then I take it you would 7 agree with me that social media has the power, both 8 unintentionally and intentionally, to influence the actions of 9 others?

MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I would say that anything
 11 that anyone ---

MR. SHERIF FODA: Mr. Commissioner.

13 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: --- is paying any large
14 amount of attention to ---

15 COMMISSIONER ROULEAU: Sorry, there's -- if you
 16 just hold on a moment, your counsel is standing up here.

MR. SHERIF FODA: I'm not sure social media can have an intent. I'm not sure if the question is precise, and I'm not sure how relevant it is in the circumstances. Perhaps social media users could have that kind of power, but my client, I don't think it's fair for him to testify about the power that social media has in terms of intent and lack of intent.

23 MS. JESSICA BARROW: I was speaking specifically 24 to social media influencers, but I'm happy to be more clear if 25 that's required.

26 COMMISSIONER ROULEAU: I think you have to be
27 more clear. Social media is something we should be looking
28 into, but ---

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1 MS. JESSICA BARROW: Sure. 2 COMMISSIONER ROULEAU: --- if you could try and 3 rephrase the question. 4 MS. JESSICA BARROW: Happy to. So to be clear, Mr. MacKenzie, I'm speaking 5 obviously specifically to the users that are using social media. 6 7 And in terms of influencing others, my question was would you 8 agree with me that those using social media can both 9 intentionally and unintentionally influence others? MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, of course. I would 10 11 imagine that any form of media, whether it's social media, television, movies, music, and if they're inundated, especially, 12 you know, in sort of a way that that becomes a large focus of 13 14 their day-to-day lives, then it would have an impact on the way that they view things, of course. 15 MS. JESSICA BARROW: And you indicated earlier 16 that depending on the platform and depending on the specific 17 post that anywhere between tens of thousands to hundreds of 18 19 thousands of people have followed you. 20 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: It's unclear. There is no real way to measure, but tens of thousands would be -- probably 21 22 be a fair assessment, yes. MS. JESSICA BARROW: I think you may have 23 indicated that one of your YouTube videos may have garnered up 24 to half-a-million views. Do I have that incorrect? 25 26 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No. Several of them have 27 in the past, yes. 28 MS. JESSICA BARROW: Okay. So I'm not going to

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take you to this specific document, but for the record, it's 1 OPP835, and it's a document published by the Canadian Anti-Hate 2 Network, which I take from your earlier testimony you disagree 3 4 with, but it describes:

"Diagolon, also referred to as Plaid 5 Army, as a conspiracy-based network 6 7 that is increasingly evolving into a 8 militia compromising neo-fascists who 9 anticipate a violent revolution which they will seize power." (As read) 10 11 I take it you disagree with that assessment of

the organisation. Is that fair? 12

13 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, I disagree, and I don't agree that this is an -- my imagination is an organisation 14 of any kind. I'm not clear on what neo-fascists accelerationist 15 means, and in my opinion the Canadian Anti-Hate Network is not a 16 credible news or information research source. 17

18 MS. JESSICA BARROW: Fair enough. But I take it you would agree with me that at least some people might 19 20 interpret your messaging in that way because obviously the Canadian Anti-Hate Network does? 21

MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Again, sure. I can't 22 control how people interpret or don't interpret, you know, any 23 number of things. I can only control things that I say and 24 conduct myself the best that I can, and if it's interpreted the 25 wrong way then I'm happy to clarify. But I can't, again, be 26 27 expected to control the interpretations of other people. 28

MS. JESSICA BARROW: Fair enough. I'll just ask

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1 one more question because I believe I'm getting the signal that 2 I'm out of time. 3 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Of course. 4 MS. JESSICA BARROW: But as a follow-up to that, there were a few veiled references to violence that we saw 5 earlier counsel take you to, and you indicated in response to 6 those that it certainly wasn't your intention to promote 7 8 violence and that your followers would know that. Is that a 9 fair assessment of your answer? 10 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, I think so. 11 MS. JESSICA BARROW: But it's true that you have not obviously spoken to all of your followers; right? 12 13 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Well, I don't exactly take 14 attendance, so there's no way to know who is listening to me at any number of -- all I can do is use my platforms accordingly, 15 and if it's listened to or not by individual people is not 16 within my control. 17 18 MS. JESSICA BARROW: And so you obviously 19 couldn't know how they're interpreting your message? 20 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No. MS. JESSICA BARROW: Okay. Thank you, those are 21 my questions. 22 COMMISSIONER ROULEAU: Okay. Next, is the 23 Ontario Provincial Police. 24 MR. CHRISTOPHER DIANA: Commissioner, I have no 25 26 questions. Thank you. 27 COMMISSIONER ROULEAU: Okay, next is counsel for 28 former Chief Sloly.

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1 MR. TOM CURRY: Commissioner, also no questions for the witness. Thank you. 2 3 COMMISSIONER ROULEAU: Okay. Next, is the 4 Government of Alberta. UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Thank you, Commissioner. 5 6 We have no questions either. 7 COMMISSIONER ROULEAU: Okay, the Democracy Fund, 8 JCCF? 9 MR. ANTOINE D'AILLY: Antoine D'Ailly for the Citizens for Freedom. Our group would like to cede our time to 10 11 counsel for the witness. **COMMISSIONER ROULEAU:** That seems to be a popular 12 person. Mr. Foda, I guess it's your turn. You seem to have 13 collected a lot of support. 14 MR. SHERIF FODA: I won't need all the time, 15 Mr. Commissioner, but I'm happy to commence now. 16 COMMISSIONER ROULEAU: Go ahead. 17 18 MR. SHERIF FODA: Thank you, sir. --- CROSS-EXAMINATION BY MR. SHERIF FODA: 19 20 MR. SHERIF FODA: Good afternoon, Mr. MacKenzie. 21 Can you see me? 22 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir. 23 MR. SHERIF FODA: This is the first time you've seen me actually on video. 24 25 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: That is correct. MR. SHERIF FODA: I want to start off with just 26 27 covering some of the questions that you were asked by the last counsel, counsel for the Ottawa Police Service. 28

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1 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Okay. 2 MR. SHERIF FODA: The Canada Anti-Hate Network, you were asked about sort of the information that they have put 3 4 out there about you. MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yeah. 5 MR. SHERIF FODA: Are you aware if the Canada 6 Anti-Network has itself spread any misinformation during the 7 8 convoy? 9 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, as a matter of fact the president or the chief, as I understand it, Mr. Farber, was 10 11 on national television advising the Nation of Canada that antisemitic flyers were being distributed throughout Downtown 12 Ottawa as a result of the nature of the people involved, when in 13 fact that was a screengrab from an event in Miami, Florida that 14 had taken place weeks earlier. 15 MR. SHERIF FODA: And do you know if the Canada 16 Anti-Hate Network's views about you have been relied upon by law 17 enforcement or other senior officials in the Federal Government? 18 19 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, I have, through, 20 again, legal disclosure, documents referenced by law enforcement, open source intelligence and so on, there are a 21 number of pages and articles and things written by the Canada 22 Anti-Hate Network used as justification for their assessment of 23 24 me. 25 MR. SHERIF FODA: And have you ever had any 26 communication with anyone from the Canada Anti-Hate Network? 27 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I have, actually. One of their journalists, Mr. Smith I believe, reached out to me in --28

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just as late as February, I was here. Previous to that, no one had ever approached me for a comment or explanation. They just were content to just publish things sometimes with no bylines whatsoever, written by ostensibly no one. I attempted to explain and kind of level, you know, man-to-man with Mr. Smith about, you know, who I am and so on. That didn't really go anywhere.

8 I had also been contact informally, casually with 9 Mr. Kurt Phillips over Twitter over the past several months 10 before I was banned.

MR. SHERIF FODA: And did your conversations have anything to do about the convoy or your alleged extremist activities?

MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No, they were pretty
casual in nature. Just about kind of surface level things about
other, you know, personalities and stuff, other maybe casual,
some of the different beers that we enjoyed, things like this.

18 MR. SHERIF FODA: You were asked questions about 19 social media and social media influencers and their ability to 20 either unintentionally or intentionally influence others. What 21 are your views on legacy media being able to do that?

22 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Well, again, yeah, with 23 seeing the size of the platform that it has and the amount of 24 funding that's being dumped into it from the Canadian taxpayer, 25 it's one of the bigger microphones that exists, and it's my 26 opinion that it has an extreme amount of bias and has been 27 almost weaponised in that way to push state and government 28 messaging to influence and, you know, perhaps correct the way

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1 that people are thinking as it benefits the people that pay 2 their bills. 3 MR. SHERIF FODA: I'd like to pull up 4 POE.JMK00000001. It's an article from the Globe and Mail. Can you see this article on your screen, Mr. MacKenzie? 5 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir. 6 7 MR. SHERIF FODA: Are you familiar with it? 8 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: No, I've never seen this 9 before. MR. SHERIF FODA: Okay, if we could scroll down a 10 11 little bit, and stop right there for a moment. Could you please read that, Mr. MacKenzie, and tell us when you're done? 12 13 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Yes, sir. Do you want me to real aloud or just silently? 14 MR. SHERIF FODA: No, just to yourself. 15 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Okay. 16 MR. SHERIF FODA: I'm going to just cover some of 17 18 the content in that. 19 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Okay. Yeah, I got it, 20 thanks. MR. SHERIF FODA: Okay, if we could go down a 21 little bit further. 22 23 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Okay. MR. SHERIF FODA: And a little bit further. 24 25 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Okay. 26 MR. SHERIF FODA: And then just a little bit 27 further. 28 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Okay.

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MR. SHERIF FODA: So this -- this was an article
 that was published around February 16th, after the *Emergencies* Act was invoked by the government.

4 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: Okay.

5 MR. SHERIF FODA: And there are comments made by 6 Public Safety Minister about -- that were later clarified by his 7 spokesperson. Mr. Mendicino didn't name any organization during 8 the news conference but his spokesperson, Alexander Cohen, later 9 said that the minister's remarks were in reference to Diagolon.

MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I see.

MR. SHERIF FODA: If we could up just a little
bit further to the comments that were actually made by Mr.
Mendicino -- no, further up, please, right there. So:

If I could first ask that JMK000 -6 7 - I think there's seven zeros and 4. And this is a clip, I understand, from your social media dated January 23rd of this 8 9 year, sir? 10 (VIDEO PLAYBACK) 11 MR. SHERIF FODA: Where was that video taken, sir? 12 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: That video was filmed 13 outside downtown waterfront in Pictou, Nova Scotia, where I 14 live. 15 MR. SHERIF FODA: And what was your intent in 16 putting out that video? 17 18 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: That was the day -- or two 19 days prior to being -- heading down to Ottawa, and there were a 20 lot of people who were on their way. They were excited to go and so on, and I was -- it was my intent to try and set a tone 21 of extreme levels of situational awareness and attentiveness to 22 the fact that there would be a lot of scrutiny on everyone and 23 so it was imperative that people conduct themselves in a 24 25 responsible and lawful manner. 26 MR. SHERIF FODA: If we could play another clip, 27 please, JMK0000002. This is a clip, I understand, Mr. ---28 (VIDEO PLAYBACK)

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1 MR. SHERIF FODA: Sorry, if we could just go back to the beginning. Mr. MacKenzie, I understand this was taken on 2 January 28th. If you could please just watch it. 3 4 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: M'hm. 5 (VIDEO PLAYBACK) MR. SHERIF FODA: Where was this video taken, 6 7 sir? 8 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: That video appears to be 9 taken in the residence I mentioned earlier that we stay at a large amount of time outside the City of Ottawa. 10 11 MR. SHERIF FODA: And what was the message that you were trying to convey? 12 13 MR. JEREMY MacKENZIE: I was just trying to keep people safe. And again, if they -- I obviously wouldn't want 14 them to intervene into something that seemed, you know, unsafe 15 or dangerous but if they could, you know, I believe that the --16 as dangerous as it could be, the Smartphones that people have 17 18 can be their best defence. It was very clear that 8 they intended to -- were promoting the idea of arming people, arming citizens -- I think it was an acronym for "liberating our 9 neighbourhood" or something like that -- and to engage the, you 10 11 know, forces of the state in violent confrontation. They were commenting on my videos and inferring that they were trying to 12 13 connect with me and so on. I found this very alarming. And I said, "All I know is what I've seen on the 22 internet. I'm simply brining it to your attention because, if I 23 were you, this is something that would concern me." And that 24 was pretty much the end of that interaction. I'm not sure 25 26 whatever took place after that but ---

The creator of a far-right, anti-government group called Diagolon told the <u>Emergencies Act inquiry</u> on Friday that he received operational information from a

Mountie during the convoy protests in Ottawa last winter.

Jeremy MacKenzie testified to the inquiry that a self-identified member of the RCMP told him that public-order units were being sent to Ottawa, where anti-government, anti-vaccine-mandate protests had taken root. Mr. MacKenzie said he attended the protests with a number of Diagolon supporters.

Police and senior federal government officials describe Diagolon as an extremist group. Mr. MacKenzie rejected this categorization in his testimony. Documents tabled at the inquiry show that law-enforcement agencies and CSIS were monitoring Diagolon members' involvement in the protests.

Mr. MacKenzie told the inquiry that the RCMP leaker also provided screenshots from a group chat that appeared to show the conversation of several RCMP officers. However, he conceded that he never verified if the source was indeed from the RCMP.

The Public Order Emergency Commission, which is led by Justice Paul Rouleau, has been given the task of determining whether the federal government erred in invoking the Emergencies Act. Friday was the final day of testimony from convoy organizers and others connected to the Ottawa protests. Their testimony and documents presented at the inquiry this week revealed contradictory views on the nature of the protests and the tactics and goals of the demonstrators.

In his testimony, Mr. MacKenzie played down his connection to Chris Lysak, who is charged in relation to an alleged plot to kill police officers at a border blockade near Coutts, Alta., which was taking place at the same time as the protests in Ottawa and also focused on COVID-19 restrictions. Yet he said that Mr. Lysak called him twice from jail after his arrest. "I just tried to offer some encouragement to him," Mr. MacKenzie said.

Public hearings on use of Emergencies Act: What to know about the commission and what's happened so far

Mr. MacKenzie presented his comments as joking, ironic or tongue in cheek. When asked about comments that could be construed as inciting violence, he said they had no nefarious meaning. Despite acknowledging Mr. Lysak's connection to Diagolon,

he suggested that a Diagolon flag patch seized as part of the arrests near Coutts – which the RCMP believed belonged to Mr. Lysak, a document shows – was potentially planted by the force.

Daniel Bulford, a former RCMP sniper and onetime member of the Prime Minister's security team, also testified on Friday. After a 15-year career, Mr. Bulford said he resigned in December, after speaking out against COVID-19 mandates. He said he was a volunteer security co-ordinator during the convoy protests and also liaised with police.

On Wednesday, Keith Wilson, a lawyer representing a number of convoy organizers, told the inquiry that the organizers received leaks from police officers. Mr. Bulford said active-duty officers never leaked him any sensitive information, but he said a number of former police officers and former members of the military, as well as "officers that were on leave for various reasons," helped him with various security tasks.

An OPP person-of-interest profile about Mr. Bulford, dated Jan. 30, suggested that Mr. Bulford may have leaked Mr. Trudeau's schedule some months before the convoy. Mr. Bulford categorically denied that in a witness statement tabled with the commission.

Mr. Bulford repeatedly told the inquiry that he had hoped police would not follow the orders of their commanders when the final police operation began on Feb. 18. He said he felt that the COVID-19 mandates were so damaging, the "right thing" would have been for police to not take part in the operation.

During the protests, the OPP also had their intelligence apparatus trained on Diagolon and those believed to be members.

In a detailed profile, dated Feb. 10, the OPP outlined that Diagolon members are encouraged to possess firearms and ammunition and that the group's online forums discuss topics such as "tactics, training, preparing for self-sufficient communities, group tactical training, acquiring PALs, etc," referring to firearm licences in Canada.

Someone police believe is linked to Diagolon was charged with assault for throwing gravel at Mr. Trudeau several months before the protests, the profile of the group

says. A separate individual profile, which appears to correspond to that same person, warned that the man was marked as "violent" in a national police database.

Tamara Lich disputes knowledge about Ottawa convoy protests during contradictory **Emergencies Act inquiry testimony**

A Feb. 21 brief compiled about Diagolon by CSIS includes a number of Mr. MacKenzie's comments about the protests. "This is the good guys versus the bad guys [Canadian government]," the document quotes him as saying. It also indicates that he said the "showdown" has finally begun, and as well that "This is the beach, get yourself out there." The document, which was tabled with the commission, says that "the beach" is a Diagolon reference to the Second World War and D-Day.

"I certainly didn't mean it in any kind of violent context, or D-Day invasion-type scenario. I just simply meant it as an encouraging call to the community at large," Mr. MacKenzie testified about the comments.

A section of the brief titled "The Violent Rhetoric of Diagolon" is redacted, but a graphic included next to it says "all justice will be non-binary" and shows a gun, a noose and the word "both?"

The CSIS document says that while there were calls from Diagolon for a peaceful protest at the beginning of the convoy, the tone changed, turning to focus on criticisms of law enforcement. "There have been more overt calls for members of Diagolon to travel to Ottawa and 'hold the line,' " it says.

Mr. MacKenzie testified from Saskatoon Correctional Centre. He is facing a litany of criminal charges in three provinces, including criminal harassment, uttering threats, assault, pointing a firearm at someone, and 10 counts of possessing restricted firearms or prohibited magazines.

His charges in Saskatchewan involve "an alleged domestic-related incident with a prior romantic partner as well as an acquaintance," according to an application brought by one of his lawyers. The charges are not linked to the convoy protests. (The application argued for Mr. MacKenzie's testimony to be delivered in camera but Justice Rouleau denied it.)

Two days after the arrests, federal Public Safety Minister Marco Mendicino said at a news conference that several of the individuals at Coutts "have strong ties to a farright extreme organization with leaders who are in Ottawa." The minister's spokesperson later confirmed that Mr. Mendicino was referring to Diagolon.

In his testimony, Mr. MacKenzie said he would not characterize the link as "strong ties."

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'Freedom Convoy' leader challenged over assertion the protest was never told to leave



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OTTAWA - "Freedom Convoy" organizer Tamara Lich insisted she was never directly told to leave Ottawa during last winter's protests, when hundreds of vehicles blocked streets around Parliament Hill as Lich and others called for an end to COVID-19 mandates, even after the Emergencies Act was invoked.

During cross-examination at the Public Order Emergency Commission on Friday, Lich said that when police told protesters in a mid-February meeting to depart, she took it as a suggestion.

She and other organizers had testified on Thursday that police did not tell them to leave the city.

- 'Diagolon' founder Jeremy MacKenzie expected to testify at Emergencies Act inquiry

Ottawa police lawyer David Migicovsky showed Lich a police log entry from that Feb. 16 meeting on Friday, when officers wrote that they told her to "depart, and message this out to others." They later noted that, "All parties were upset and Lich was crying."

Lich said she remembers becoming emotional. "I think I said something to the effect of 'I can't believe that you're about to do this to your own people."

She told the commission she still felt those instructions were merely a suggestion to leave.

Prime Minister Justin Trudeau invoked the Emergencies Act for the first time in Canadian history on Feb. 14, arguing its temporary and extraordinary powers were needed to end blockades in Ottawa and at border crossings.

That decision came after weeks of what Trudeau called an "illegal occupation" of downtown Ottawa.

Paul Champ, a lawyer representing Ottawa residents and businesses, reminded the commission that the protest was deemed an unlawful occupation, that the city and the province declared states of emergency, local residents launched a lawsuit against the organizers and the court granted an injunction to stop protesters from honking truck horns at night.

"That wasn't a message that maybe it was time to leave?" Champ asked.

"We had a message, too," Lich replied, adding that after hearing "heartbreaking" stories during the pandemic, she felt the protesters' message was more important.

She did say that she would have left if the court had ordered her to.

"My understanding was that as long as we were peaceful and complied with the order we were permitted to stay," she said.

The commission also heard from two protesters Friday who made a point of joining the protest after the Emergencies Act was invoked.

"I rushed back to Ottawa to do what I could to protect the peaceful citizens of the protests," Chris Deering, a Canadian Armed Forces veteran, testified Friday.

He said he believed he was still entitled to be downtown Ottawa, though he knew police were warning people to leave.

"I'm a free citizen of this country. I'm a taxpayer. I'm a veteran. I'm a good person. And I felt I had the right to be there with my Canadian citizens to try to protect them," he said.

Deering was arrested using force near the National War Memorial

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during a massive police operation on Feb. 18. He was later released without charges.

Maggie Hope Braun also returned to Ottawa after Feb. 14 and was also arrested, but not charged.

"I don't believe that if a government passes a law, it means that we have to go against what we believe is right," she testified. "We still have a right to peacefully protest and assemble."

Both protesters spoke about how positive and peaceful their experience was in Ottawa before they were arrested.

In response, Emilie Taman, a lawyer representing Ottawa residents and businesses, played a 10 minute compilation of videos of loud horn honking, blocked streets, open fires, large collections of jerry cans of fuel and other scenes from the convoy protest.

Supporters in the hearing room gallery were heard softly laughing during the video, and one man made a honking gesture with his arm.

Friday's hearings also included "Diagolon" founder Jeremy MacKenzie, who took part in the "Freedom Convoy" and testified from a correctional facility in Saskatchewan, where he is being held on charges unrelated to the protests.

Public Safety Minister Marco Mendicino flagged MacKenzie as a national security risk in February, saying people at the Coutts, Alta., border crossing blockade had "strong ties" to Diagolon, which he referred to as "a far-right extreme organization."

In intelligence reports released at the public inquiry, the RCMP described Diagolon as a "militia-like network with members who are armed and preparing for violence" and having supporters "akin to accelerationism" who wanted to overthrow the government.

MacKenzie said many of his supporters are firearms enthusiasts, but argued police forces were citing unreliable information provided by the Canadian Anti-Hate Network.

"There is certainly not anything resembling a militia or anything to this extent," he said.

He said he knew one of the people who was charged in relation to the protests in Coutts but otherwise had no connection to the Alberta blockades, and had little interaction with convoy organizers in Ottawa.

MacKenzie's lawyer unsuccessfully applied to the commission earlier this week to allow him to testify in private or under a publication ban, citing upcoming court cases.

MacKenzie is facing assault and weapons charges in Saskatchewan and was charged with firearms offences in Nova Scotia in January. He's also been charged with harassment and intimidation in March after an anti-mask protest outside the home of Nova Scotia's chief medical officer of health.




Jeremy Mackenzie: Nova Scotia-Based Extremist YouTuber Spreads Hate

His one-man protest was quickly lauded by those across the conservative spectrum, from run-of-the-mill pro-military folks to th we recognize from far-right spaces.



February found Jeremy and his latest girlfriend, **Morgan Guptill**, appearing at a peace bond hearing in Halifax.


Former friend **Samantha Monaghan** applied for a peace bond because she claimed MacKenzie and Guptill's harassment was making her suicidal. (Even after Monaghan's 11year-old son, **Luc**, died in November, Guptill kept tormenting her.)

Guptill accused Monaghan, in a series of texts and Facebook posts, of "grifting" for funeral expenses. On Christmas Eve Guptill lambasted her for not having life insurance on Luc, who had a variety of terminal medical conditions from birth.

Guptill also accused Monaghan, a former leader of the Freedom N.S. collective which organized the earliest protests against lockdowns and mask mandates, of stealing from the Freedom Convoy. The hearing also introduced a handful of fringe characters inhabiting the Maritime freedom community, including Cindy Macdonald, a disgraced nurse who dispenses drugs and medical advice from a clinic out of her house near Fredericton.

Morgan urged Samantha to take Luc to see Macdonald, a prominent member of the the antivaxxer collective 'Canadian Frontline Nurses.'

At Cindy's 'Wellness Hub,' Samantha told the hearing that the nurse, unable to find a proper blood collection needle, poked her son's finger for a blood sample and let it drip into a "pee bottle."

Promising to send the sample for analysis, Samantha then said Cindy handed her another pee bottle full of Ivermectin, the alt-right miracle cure. She instructed Samantha to start giving it to her son immediately. She didn't.

In her defence, Guptill testified she was still concerned about Samantha's mental health, but Justice of the Peace Darlene Lamey wasn't buying.

"(Guptill) was aware of the death of Ms. Monaghan's child... aware that what she was doing was causing harm... [and she] crossed the boundary into cruelty...cruel and beyond the pale."

Lamey ruled that Guptill, who owns property in Cole Harbour but lives with Jeremy in his parents' basement in Pictou, must refrain from contacting Monaghan and not mention her on social media for one year.

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




Israel is a racially segregated state with different legal systems applied depending on your ethnicity. Arabs and Muslims are sub-human status.


There is a giant wall manned by soldiers, razor wire and mines. War crimes are routine.


